### A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE WOMEN AND INFANT CHILDREN FARMERS' MARKET NUTRITION PROGRAM.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. A wealth of research has been conducted
- 2 establishing a link between poverty, obesity, and poor
- 3 nutrition. Among the low-income population, allocating meager
- 4 funds often represents a choice between equally necessary
- 5 expenses, and while a healthy diet is a noble goal, choosing
- 6 healthful food can be a costly course of action. This issue
- 7 becomes especially salient when it comes to the specific
- nutritional needs of low-income pregnant women and young 8
- 9 children, and it falls upon the social safety net provided by
- 10 the State to help address this pressing need.
- 11 Intimately connected to the social safety net is the health
- 12 of the state economy. The legislature finds that
- 13 diversification of the state economy is key to building a stable
- 14 commercial base. By varying industry, Hawaii can best draw upon
- 15 its diverse occupational talent pool, create career paths and
- 16 products that capitalize on Hawaii's unique location and needs,
- 17 and shape a profile able to withstand economic fluctuation in

- 1 both national and international economies. Given the state's
- 2 location and heritage, nowhere is this opportunity more present
- 3 than in diversified agriculture.
- 4 The United States Department of Agriculture's Women and
- 5 Infant Children Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (Program) is
- 6 an ideal way to address each issue in a cost-effective,
- 7 efficient manner, at minimal cost to the State. The Program
- 8 awarded \$19,300,000 nationwide in 2009, to provide recipients of
- 9 the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants,
- 10 and Children the opportunity to purchase fresh fruits and
- 11 vegetables at local registered farmer's markets. The current
- 12 structure of this grant program requires that State agencies
- 13 operating the Program must match the federal administrative
- 14 funds allocated to them by contributing at least thirty per cent
- 15 of the administrative cost of the program, which typically
- 16 amounts to between six and ten per cent of the total award.
- 17 The economic effect of implementing this federal
- 18 partnership program would be two-fold. First, it would
- 19 supplement the social safety net by drawing down federal funds
- 20 to assure low-income pregnant women and children greater variety
- 21 and nutritive value in their food, and second, it would support

- 1 the agricultural sector of Hawaii's economy since all funds
- 2 awarded through the Program go straight to local farmers.
- 3 Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds
- 4 as a State match for the establishment and administration of the
- 5 Program.
- 6 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$10,000 or so much
- 8 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2010-2011 for the
- 9 department of health to develop and administer the Women and
- 10 Infant Children Farmers' Market Nutrition Program; provided that
- the department of health shall develop and submit to the Food 11
- 12 and Nutrition Service of the United States Department of
- 13 Agriculture a state plan describing the manner in which it
- 14 intends to implement, operate, and administer all aspects of the
- Women and Infant Children Farmers' Market Nutrition Program. 15
- 16 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- of health for the purposes of this Act. 17
- SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2010. 18
