### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TECHNOLOGY.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Through Act 2 of the First Special Session of
- 2 2007, the legislature created the Hawaii broadband task force to
- 3 provide recommendations on how to advance Hawaii's broadband
- 4 capabilities and use. The legislature finds that advanced
- 5 broadband services are essential infrastructure for an
- 6 innovation economy and a knowledge society in the twenty-first
- 7 century. High-speed broadband services at affordable prices are
- 8 essential for the advancement of education, health, public
- 9 safety, research and innovation, civic participation,
- 10 e-government, economic development and diversification, and
- 11 public safety and services. The legislature also recognizes the
- 12 evolution in the manner in which communications and information
- 13 services are delivered to the consumer, including by wireline,
- 14 wireless, cable television, and satellite infrastructures, and
- 15 that the voice, video, and data services provided over these
- 16 infrastructures are converging.

1	Meet	ing the following goals is critical if Hawaii is to
2	compete s	uccessfully in the global economy of the twenty-first
3	century:	
4	(1)	Ensure access to broadband communications to all
5		households, businesses, and organizations throughout
6		Hawaii by 2012 at speeds and prices comparable to the
7		average speeds and prices available in the top three
8		performing countries in the world;
9	(2)	Increase availability of advanced broadband
10		communications service on a competitive basis to
11		reduce prices, increase service penetration, and
12		improve service to all persons in Hawaii;
13	(3)	Increase broadband availability at affordable costs to
14		low-income and other disadvantaged groups, including
15		by making low-cost, broadband-capable computers
16		available to eligible recipients;
17	(4)	Increase sharing of the infrastructure used to deploy
18		broadband in order to speed up implementation, reduce
19		costs to providers, reduce underlying costs to
20		providers through incentives rather than eminent
21		domain procedures, ease deployment of broadband, and
22		ease entry into a competitive broadband marketplace;

1	(5)	Increase flexible, timely, and responsible access to
2		public rights-of-way and public facilities for
3		broadband service providers; and
4	(6)	Develop a more streamlined permit approval process
5		that reduces the time and cost of infrastructure
6		deployment, to be created jointly by disparate
7		permitting agencies, stakeholders, and other
8		interested parties.
9	The	purpose of this Act is to begin implementation of
10	activitie	s to achieve these goals by:
11	(1)	Establishing an office of telework promotion and
12		broadband assistance and a broadband advisory council,
13	(2)	Establishing a work group to develop procedures for
14		streamlined permitting functions applicable to the
15		development of broadband services or technology; and
16	(3)	Requiring all state agencies to report annually to the
17		legislature on all expenditures of federal moneys
18		received pursuant to the American Recovery and
19		Reinvestment Act of 2009 or other federal funds, for
20		the purposes of purchasing broadband facilities,
21		services, or equipment, or entering into contracts for

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broadband-related projects.

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1	SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
2	adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read
3	as follows:
4	"CHAPTER
5	HAWAII BROADBAND ASSISTANCE
6	§ -1 Office of telework promotion and broadband
7	assistance; establishment; duties. (a) There is established
8	within the department of commerce and consumer affairs for
9	administrative purposes, the office of telework promotion and
10	broadband assistance to encourage telework as a family-friendly,
11	business-friendly public policy that promotes workplace
12	efficiency and reduces strain on transportation infrastructure.
13	The director of commerce and consumer affairs shall appoint an
14	executive director and such additional telework and broadband
15	professionals as deemed necessary to work with public and
16	private entities to develop widespread access to broadband
17	services.
18	(b) The executive director shall have the following
19	duties:
20	(1) Promote and encourage use of telework alternatives for
21	public and private employees, including but not
22	limited to appropriate policy and legislative

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	initiatives. Upon request, the executive director may
	advise and assist private sector employers in Hawaii
	in planning, developing, and administering programs,
	projects, plans, policies, and other activities for
	telecommuting by private sector employees and in
	developing incentives provided by the private sector
	to encourage private sector employers in Hawaii to
	utilize employee telecommuting;
(2)	Advise and assist state agencies, and upon request of

- (2) Advise and assist state agencies, and upon request of the counties, advise and assist the counties, in planning, developing, and administering programs, projects, plans, policies, and other activities to promote telecommuting by employees of state and county agencies;
- (3) Support the efforts of both public and private entities in Hawaii to enhance or facilitate the deployment of, and access to competitively priced, advanced electronic communications services, commonly known as broadband, and internet access services of general application throughout Hawaii;
- (4) Work towards establishing affordable, accessible
  broadband services to unserved areas of Hawaii and

I		monitor advancements in communication that will
2		facilitate this goal;
3	(5)	Advocate for, and facilitate the development and
4		deployment of, applications, programs, and services
5		including, but not limited to telework, telemedicine,
6		and e-learning that will bolster the usage of and
7		demand for broadband level telecommunications;
8.	(6)	Serve as a broadband information and applications
9		clearinghouse for the State and a coordination point
10		for broadband-related services and programs;
11	(7)	Advise the director of commerce and consumer affairs
12		on broadband adoption, deployment, and application
13		issues; and
14	(8)	Coordinate activities regarding telework with, and
15		regularly report to, the broadband advisory council.
16	(c)	The executive director shall submit an annual report
17	to the leg	gislature on the operations of the office of telework
18	promotion	and broadband assistance, including telework
19	participat	tion levels and trends of both private and public
20	sector emp	oloyees in Hawaii.
21	§ -	-2 Broadband advisory council; purpose; membership;
22	compensat:	ion; chairperson. (a) There is established within the
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- 1 department of commerce and consumer affairs for administrative
- 2 purposes, the broadband advisory council to advise on policy and
- 3 funding priorities to expedite deployment and reduce the cost of
- 4 broadband access in Hawaii.
- 5 (b) The council shall be composed of thirteen members
- 6 appointed by the governor, as provided in section 26-34, except
- 7 as otherwise provided in this section:
- 8 (1) Two members of the senate, appointed by the president
- 9 of the senate;
- 10 (2) Two members of the house of representatives, appointed
- by the speaker of the house of representatives;
- 12 (3) Four representatives of federal, state, and county
- government entities having a role in infrastructure
- deployment; management of public rights-of-way,
- regulation, and franchising; information technology;
- and economic development; and
- 17 (4) Five representatives of Hawaii's private sector
- 18 technology, telecommunications, and investment
- industries, including the incumbent local exchange
- carrier.
- 21 All members shall serve for a term of four years. Any vacancies
- 22 occurring in the membership of the advisory council shall be

2	manner as	the original appointments.
3	(c)	The members of the advisory council shall select the
4	chairpers	on of the advisory council and shall meet at times as
5	may be ca	lled by the chairperson or a majority of the advisory
6	council.	Members shall be reimbursed for reasonable expenses,
7	including	travel expenses, necessary for the performance of
8	their dut	ies. Administrative support to the advisory council
9	shall be	provided by the office of telework promotion and
10	broadband	assistance.
11	(d)	The advisory council shall:
12	(1)	Monitor the broadband-based development efforts of
13		other states and nations in areas such as business,
14		education, and health;
15	(2)	Advise the office of telework promotion and broadband
16		assistance and the legislature on policies and
17		strategies related to making affordable broadband
18		services available to every Hawaii home and business;

level;

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1	(4)	Monitor regulatory and policy changes for potential
2		impact on broadband deployment and sustainability in
3		Hawaii;
4	(5)	Encourage public-private partnerships to increase the
5		deployment and adoption of broadband services and
6		applications; and
7	(6)	Periodically review and comment on the quality,
8		availability, and accessibility of state-maintained or
9		funded broadband resources and programs.
10	(e)	The advisory council shall submit an annual report to
11	the legis	lature and the office of telework promotion and
12	broadband	assistance on the progress towards the goal of
13	universal	access to broadband communication for businesses and
14	on the as:	sessment of state broadband infrastructure investments
15	and utili:	zation of advisory council supported resources to
16	promote b	roadband access."
17	SECT	ION 3. Work group; establishment; reporting. (a) The
18	director o	of commerce and consumer affairs shall convene a work
19	group to	develop procedures for streamlined permitting functions
20	that are a	applicable to the development of broadband services and
21	broadband	technology which are normally available to state and
22	local gove	ernments for the use or development of broadband

1	service o	r broadband technology. Members of the work group
2	shall inc	lude:
3	(1)	The director of commerce and consumer affairs, or the
4		director's designee;
5	(2)	The mayor of the county of Hawaii, or the mayor's
6		designee;
7	(3)	The mayor of the city and county of Honolulu, or the
8		mayor's designee;
9	(4)	The mayor of the county of Kauai, or the mayor's
10		designee;
11	(5)	The mayor of the county of Maui, or the mayor's
12		designee;
13	(6)	The chairperson of the Hawaii broadband task force
14		established by Act 2, First Special Session Laws of
15		Hawaii 2007; and
16	(7)	Two representatives of state agencies with
17		jurisdiction over land use and permitting at the state
18		level.
19	(b)	The work group shall submit to the legislature no
20	later than	n January 1, 2011, a report with its recommended
21	procedures	s for streamlining and expediting all permitting
22	functions	normally available to state and local governments for

- the use or development of broadband service or broadband 1
- 2 technology. The procedures shall be consistent across all
- 3 counties and shall provide that any permitting fees and revenues
- 4 traditionally accruing to the counties that relate to the use or
- 5 development of broadband service or broadband technology will
- 6 continue to accrue to the counties once the procedures go into
- 7 effect.
- 8 SECTION 4. All state agencies shall report annually to the
- 9 legislature on the receipt and expenditure of federal moneys
- 10 from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, and
- moneys from other federal appropriation measures or applicable 11
- 12 federal acts, for the purposes of purchasing broadband
- 13 facilities, services, or equipment, or for entering into
- 14 contracts for broadband-related projects.

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#### Report Title:

Technology; Broadband; Office of Telework Promotion and Broadband Assistance; Broadband Advisory Council; Federal Moneys

#### Description:

Establishes an office of telework promotion and broadband assistance and a broadband advisory council; establishes a work group to develop procedures for streamlined permitting functions applicable to development of broadband services or technology; requires all state agencies to report annually to the legislature on expenditures of federal moneys for broadband facilities, services, equipment, or contracts.

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
