A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII TEACHER STANDARDS BOARD.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that part II, Act 2, 2 Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2009, required the legislative 3 reference bureau, the University of Hawaii at Manoa college of 4 education, and the Hawaii teacher standards board to make 5 recommendations to the 2010 legislature regarding the roles and 6 responsibilities of the Hawaii teacher standards board. The 7 Hawaii Teacher Standards Board - is Oversight Needed?, Report No. 1, 2010, by the legislative reference bureau; Report on 8 9 Hawai'i Teacher Standards Board, November 2009, by the University 10 of Hawaii system; and Report to the 2010 Legislature in Response 11 to HB183 CD1, by the Hawaii teacher standards board, contain numerous recommendations, both long- and short-term. 12

13 The purpose of this Act is to implement recommendations for 14 the Hawaii teacher standards board from these three reports by: 15 (1) Requiring the board to include expenditure information 16 in its annual report;

8	(4)	Submitting an annual report to the governor, the
9		legislature, and the board of education on the board's
10		operations and expenditures, and from the 2007-2008
11		school year, submitting a summary report every five
12		years of the board's accomplishment of objectives,
13		efforts to improve or maintain teacher quality, and
14		efforts to keep its operations responsive and
15		efficient;
16	(5)	Conducting a cyclical review of standards and
17		suggesting revisions for their improvement;
18	(6)	Establishing licensing fees in accordance with chapter
19		91 and determining the manner by which fees are
20		collected and subsequently deposited into the state
21		treasury and credited to the Hawaii teacher standards
22		board special fund;

1	(7)	Establishing penalties in accordance with chapter 91;
2	(8)	Issuing, renewing, revoking, suspending, and
3		reinstating licenses;
4	(9)	Reviewing reports from the department on individuals
5		hired on an emergency basis;

7		and conducting licensing evaluations;
8	(11)	Preparing and disseminating teacher licensing

1	(17) Adopting, amending, repealing, or suspending the
2	policies and standards of the board.
3	(b) If, in accordance with chapter 92, the board
4	determines, on a case-by-case basis, that extenuating
5	circumstances exist to justify the suspension, the board may
6	temporarily suspend its rules, or any portion thereof. The
7	board shall establish, in accordance with chapter 91, procedures
8	for the suspension of its rules. When determining whether to
9	suspend its rules, the board shall also establish the length of
10	time for which the suspension shall be in effect.
11	(c) The board, in accordance with chapter 92, may also
12	amend licensing-related fees and set or amend other charges
13	related to the performance of its duties.
14	(d) The board may delegate to the executive director, or
15	other designee, any of its powers and duties as it deems
16	reasonable and proper; provided that the delegation of powers
17	and duties by the board shall be made in accordance with
18	procedures set forth in this subsection. The board shall not
19	delegate the following discretionary functions resulting in a
20	final decision:
21	(1) Adopting, amending, or repealing rules;

19	economy.	The board is working with eHawaii.gov to use credit
20	card and e	eCheck payments of license fees instead of the current
21	payroll de	eduction method, which will enable the board to have a
22	better ac	counting of fees being collected and ensuring that all

1 licensees are paying their fees. The current payroll deduction 2 method was created in 1997, and is administered by the 3 department of education, making license fee payment heavily reliant on a teacher's employment status. In all other states 4 5 license fees are paid in advance of receiving a license, not on 6 a pay-as-you-go basis as exists in Hawaii. The board's new 7 payment method is expected to address this matter, and the board 8 is providing for a transition period for licensees and allowing 9 licensees to choose from among several payment options as long 10 as payment for a five-year license is made over a period of no 11 more than twelve months.

(b) The board shall review implementation of the revised fee collections and determine if the changes result in sufficient increased income to fund fully the expenses of the board, including all operations and personnel costs, and reimbursement to board members for travel expenses, pursuant to section 302A-806, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

(c) If, by December 1, 2010, the board determines that the
increased revenue is not sufficient to fund fully the expenses
of the board, the board shall submit to the legislature no later
than twenty days prior to the regular session of 2011 a plan and
timetable for increasing the license fees.

1 SECTION 5. (a) The Hawaii teacher standards board is 2 responsible for establishing licensing standards that govern 3 teacher licensing; issuing, renewing, revoking, suspending, and 4 reinstating teacher licenses; approving teacher education 5 programs in the State; and developing, implementing, and 6 administering the national board certification support program. 7 The board has been unable to carry out all its responsibilities 8 successfully and may need to transfer some of the duties to 9 other agencies. 10 The board shall develop a comprehensive plan for (b) 11 transferring nonessential functions and duties to other 12 agencies, including the department of education. 13 The board shall submit the plan to the legislature no (C)14 later than twenty days prior to the regular session of 2011. While the Hawaii teacher standards board 15 SECTION 6. (a) 16 has developed teacher licensing standards, it has failed to 17 require teachers seeking license renewal to verify that they meet all ten teacher performance standards as is required by 18 19 section 302A-805(a), Hawaii Revised Statutes. Moreover, 20 teachers who currently hold licenses that are due for an initial 21 renewal do not have to demonstrate that they meet any of the 22 standards, because the mere payment of the license renewal fee SB2591 SD2 LRB 10-1928.doc

1	and the completion of an application will entitle these teachers
2	to a renewed license. Not until the teachers' subsequent
3	renewal, five years later, will licensing standards be applied,
4	and then the applicant must only provide evidence of meeting two
5	of the ten teacher performance standards.
6	(b) The board shall review its teacher license renewal
7	process and determine whether the board should:
8	(1) Modify the licensing standards;
9	(2) Modify its approach in determining whether a renewal
10	applicant is in compliance by having satisfied all the
11	standards; or
12	(3) Recommend amendments to section 302A-805(a), Hawaii
13	Revised Statutes, to conform to the board's present
14	requirements for license renewal and thus eliminate
15	the conflict with the statute.
16	(c) The board shall submit findings and recommendations to
17	the legislature no later than twenty days prior to convening of
18	the regular session of 2011.
19	SECTION 7. (a) The Hawaii teacher standards board has
20	been administratively attached to the department of education
21	since 1995, yet the board and its executive director have failed
22	to understand the nature of the relationship of an attached

1 agency and principal department, and their appropriate roles.
2 This has impeded development of a smooth working relationship
3 between the two entities and contributed to the lack of
4 oversight of the board's operations, including the board's
5 failure to provide oversight of its executive director, the
6 board's finances, or the development of the online licensing
7 system.

8 (b) The Hawaii teacher standards board and the department 9 of education shall clarify their respective powers, duties, 10 responsibilities, and the relationship between the two agencies, 11 including the interim policies and procedures for the mutual 12 sharing of data necessary for licensing and verifying the status 13 of teachers, pursuant to section 6 of Act 2, Special Session 14 Laws of Hawaii 2009.

(c) The board shall submit findings and recommendations to
the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the regular
session of 2011.

18 SECTION 8. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed19 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

20 SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2070;
21 provided that the amendments to section 302A-805, Hawaii Revised
22 Statutes, made by section 3 of this Act shall not be repealed
