A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Urban sprawl combined with the proliferation of 1 2 "fake farms" and "gentlemen estates" in agricultural districts has caused an increasing number of incidents in which farmers 3 have been accused of using pesticides irresponsibly. 4 While 5 none of these accusations has been substantiated, they have significantly increased the burden on the department of 6 agriculture's pesticides branch personnel to ensure that safe 7 and permitted pesticide application and storage practices are 8 being followed. 9

The pesticides use revolving fund was established by the 10 legislature in 1996 and its authorizing statute was amended in 11 12 2000 to allow the fund to be used to pay for personnel costs, but limited those costs to employees performing registration and 13 14 education services only. With the increased compliance monitoring workload and reduced staffing and funding caused by 15 the State's economic downturn, it is reasonable that this 16 revolving fund be used to pay for compliance monitoring costs 17

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incurred because of public demand for protection of the 1 2 environment and the public's own perceived well-being. SECTION 2. Section 149A-13.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 3 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows: 4 5 "(b) Moneys in the pesticide use revolving fund shall be expended by the department to support the pesticide program's 6 registration and licensing, certification and education, and 7 8 compliance monitoring activities. The department shall also expend revolving fund moneys on the establishment of pesticide 9 10 training workshops, educational programs, development of integrated pest management strategies, and other services for 11 pesticide users such as the agricultural pest control industry, 12 the structural pest control industry, and consumer users of 13 14 pesticides, which provide pesticide instruction in areas including but not limited to the collection, disposal, and 15 recycling of pesticide containers and all other pesticide 16 17 services deemed necessary by the department. Moneys from the revolving fund may be used for personnel, services, materials, 18 19 and equipment for the purposes of this section [; provided that the use of moneys from the revolving fund for personnel costs 20 21 shall be limited to those employees under the registration and 22 education section of the department's pesticides branch].

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Moneys expended by the department from the pesticide use revolving fund for training workshops, educational programs, and other services for the agricultural pest control industry, the structural pest control industry, and consumer groups shall be expended in a manner that appropriately addresses the needs of each category of pesticide user."

SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketedand stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2010.

While none of these accusations has been substantiated, they have significantly increased the burden on the Department of Agriculture pesticides branch personnel to ensure that safe and permitted pesticide application and storage practices are being followed.

With the increased workload and reduced staffing and funding caused by the economic downturn, it is reasonable that the Pesticides Use Revolving Fund be used to pay for compliance monitoring costs which are incurred because of the public's demand for protection of the environment and the public's own perceived well-being.

Impact on the public: Enhanced ability to respond to community complaints and concerns regarding pesticide use.
