A BILL FOR AN ACT

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 431, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended 2 by adding to part I of article 10A a new section to be
 - 3 appropriately designated and to read as follows:
 - 4 "<u>\$431:10A-A.</u> Extension of dependent coverage. (a) A
 - 5 health insurance plan issued by an accident and sickness insurer
 - 6 shall make available, at the option of the principal enrollee
 - 7 under the plan, coverage for any qualified child, as defined in
 - 8 subsection (b), of the enrollee.
 - 9 (b) The term "qualified child" means, with respect to a
- 10 principal enrollee in a health insurance plan, an individual
- 11 who, but for age, would be treated as a dependent child of the

TITLE:

PURPOSE:

To require health insurers to offer the option of coverage for uninsured young adults as dependents until the age of

twenty-seven.

MEANS:

Add new sections to article 10A of chapter 431 and chapter 432, Hawaii Revised Statutes; amend section 432D-

23, HRS.

JUSTIFICATION:

Young adults can have difficulty obtaining affordable health insurance, particularly if they remain in the educational system past the age of majority. This bill allows parents the option of continuing to cover their children as dependents until the age of 27. This bill may be particularly important if the economy remains weak and young adults have difficulty getting employer based health insurance.

Impact on the public: This bill will help young adults obtain affordable health insurance through their parent's coverage on an optional basis.
