A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that provisions within 2 the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2010, 3 P.L. 111-84, requires states to mail absentee ballots to 4 uniformed and overseas voters no later than forty-five days 5 prior to elections for federal office. The legislature also 6 finds that Hawaii law allows only forty-five days between 7 primary and general elections, making meeting the federal 8 mailing deadlines an impossibility. 9 Federal law allows for a state to request a waiver of the 10 requirement on an election-by-election basis, if the state can 11 show that it has alternative means by which it can ensure access 12 to the ballot for overseas voters. The law further provides 13 that the request must be made more than ninety days before the 14 general election and that the approval or denial of the request 15 will occur no later than sixty-five days before the general

election.

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1 With this in mind, state election officials sought to immediately submit the State of Hawaii's application for this 2 3 waiver, but they have been informed that the federal government 4 is still determining the specifics of the waiver application 5 process and, as such, are not accepting applications at this 6 time. 7 The purpose of this Act is to move Hawaii's primary 8 election date to the second Saturday in August and to move the 9 deadline for filing nomination papers to the first Tuesday in **10** June. SECTION 2. Section 12-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 11 **12** amended to read as follows: 13 "§12-2 Primary held when; candidates only those nominated. 14 The primary shall be held [at the polling place for each 15 precinct] on the second [to the last] Saturday of [September] 16 August in every even numbered year[; provided that in no case 17 shall any primary election precede a general election by less 18 than forty-five days]. 19 No person shall be a candidate for any general or special

general election unless the person has been nominated in the

immediately preceding primary or special primary."

Elections; Primary Election Dates; Filing Deadline

Description:

Changes the date of the primary election to the second Saturday of August for primary elections, including the OHA board. Changes the filing deadline for nomination papers to the first Tuesday in June, except for special primary or special elections. Effective July 1, 2050, shall apply to the primary elections held prior to the regularly scheduled general election held in November 2060, and every election thereafter. (SD1)

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
