### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH SAVINGS ACCOUNTS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Health savings accounts (HSAs) are an
- 2 encouraging development in the health insurance market, creating
- 3 a new opportunity for affordable coverage and engaging patients
- 4 as partners in managing costs and achieving high value in health
- 5 care spending.
- 6 HSAs combine a tax-advantaged savings account earmarked for
- 7 medical expenses with a high-deductible health insurance plan
- 8 (HDHP). Lower insurance premiums offset, in part or in full,
- 9 the amount used to fund the account, which in turn can be used
- 10 to pay expenses before the deductible has been met.
- 11 HSA funds belong to the account holder, and unspent
- 12 balances accumulate and accrue interest, tax-free, from year to
- 13 year. When health care costs meet the high deductible, health
- 14 plan coverage applies, typically in the form of a preferred
- 15 provider organization, with little to no cost-sharing and limits
- 16 on total out-of-pocket expenses.
- 17 Because patients using HSA funds are literally spending
- 18 their own money, they have greater control over their health 2010-0755 SB SMA.doc



- 1 care decisions, while assuming greater financial responsibility
- 2 for those decisions. Because patients are spending their own
- 3 money before the deductible is met, high deductibles shift the
- 4 locus of cost-consciousness, and thus decision making, from
- 5 third-party payers to patients and those who care for them.
- 6 Such cost-consciousness is a welcome antidote to the widening
- 7 divide between public expectations and rising health care costs
- 8 and could lessen the need for heavy-handed managed care or
- 9 government controls. HSAs encourage patients to comparison shop
- 10 among treatment options, as well as among physicians and
- 11 hospitals. Only a critical mass of savvy shoppers is needed to
- 12 make health care markets more responsive for everyone.
- In addition, HSAs provide a health coverage option to those
- 14 who prefer to purchase true insurance protection against the
- 15 financial consequences of low-probability, high-cost events,
- 16 rather than coverage that, to a large extent, amounts to
- 17 prepayment of anticipated and routine health care. High
- 18 deductibles keep premiums down, bringing coverage within reach
- 19 for many low-income individuals and families.
- 20 Several features of HSAs protect against inappropriate
- 21 underutilization of care. The savings account itself allows
- 22 enrollees to set aside money to pay for medical expenses,

- 1 particularly expenses incurred before the deductible has been
- 2 met. Federal law requires HSA high-deductible health plans to
- 3 provide a stop-loss limit on patient out-of-pocket expenses.
- 4 Someone with a chronic or expensive medical condition could find
- 5 an HSA more affordable than conventional coverage because of the
- 6 premium savings, out-of-pocket spending limits, and tax
- 7 advantages, in addition to greater control over health care
- 8 decisions.
- 9 HSA coverage may encourage patients to seek health
- 10 information that, in turn, prompts greater use of preventive
- 11 services or adoption of healthy lifestyle habits. HSAs could
- 12 also increase aversion to future costs of expensive or chronic
- 13 conditions. In any case, more evidence is needed on the actual
- 14 impact of HSAs on patient behavior, and on mechanisms through
- 15 which such impact occurs.
- 16 It is imperative that health care leaders come together to
- 17 discuss ways in which HSAs can assume a more meaningful role in
- 18 health care coverage in Hawaii. Under the Hawaii Prepaid Health
- 19 Care Act, all health insurance plans offered by Hawaii employers
- 20 must be approved as a qualified plan by the state Hawaii Prepaid
- 21 Health Care Council. Issues with the Hawaii Prepaid Health Care
- 22 Act need to be addressed in order to determine the role of HSAs



- 1 in Hawaii's health insurance market. HSAs are currently an
- 2 option under the Hawaii Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust
- 3 Fund, as well as an option for sole proprietors, self-employed
- 4 individuals, and those working as part-time employees.
- 5 The rapidly rising cost of health care is crippling
- 6 businesses, forcing layoffs and pay reductions. It is important
- 7 that businesses and health care consumers have access to all
- 8 health plan options to lower costs and increase quality of care.
- 9 Allowing consumers to enroll in a health savings account will
- 10 help lower the cost of health care, encourage healthier
- 11 lifestyles, provide greater patient and physician control of
- 12 health care decisions, and save money for employers and
- 13 employees alike.
- 14 The purpose of this Act is to establish a task force to
- 15 evaluate the current state of health savings accounts options in
- 16 Hawaii's health insurance market and to explore ways to expand
- 17 access to these accounts in Hawaii.
- 18 SECTION 2. (a) There is established the health savings
- 19 accounts assessment task force within the department of labor
- 20 and industrial relations for administrative purposes and
- 21 consisting of the following members:



1	(1)	The director of labor and industrial relations, who
2		shall appoint the task force members by August 1,
3		2010;
4	(2)	Four members of the Hawaii Prepaid Health Care
5		Advisory Council;
6	(3)	Three members or employees of the Hawaii Medical
7		Association;
8	(4)	Three representatives from the health insurance
9		industry;
10	(5)	Four representatives from non-government employee
11		unions;
12	(6)	One representative from First Hawaiian Bank; and
13	(7)	Four representatives from other interested
14		organizations or stakeholders, at the discretion of
15		the director of labor and industrial relations.
16	The	task force shall elect from among its members a
17	chairpers	on and any other officers it deems necessary. Members
18	of the ta	sk force shall not be compensated.
19	The	task force shall convene its initial meeting no later
20	than twen	ty days after the director of labor and industrial
21	relations	has appointed all of the members of the taskforce.
22	(b)	The task force shall:

1	(1)	Study the current state of health savings accounts	
2		options in Hawaii's health insurance market;	
3	(2)	Establish a plan of action to encourage and expand the	
4		use of health savings accounts in Hawaii, including	
5		potential amendments to the Hawaii Revised Statutes;	
6	(3)	Identify and recruit health plans that may help expand	
7	•	the availability of health savings accounts in Hawaii;	
8		and	
9	(4)	Assess the potential economic impact, including costs	
10		and benefits, of expanding health savings accounts	
11		options in Hawaii, and estimate the potential monetary	
12		savings for individuals and employers who are offered	
13		health savings accounts.	
14	For the purposes of this subsection, "health savings account"		
15	means a tax-deferred personal savings account, as set forth in		
16	Internal Revenue Code Section 223, linked to a high-deductible		
17	health insurance policy and to which employers, sole		
18	proprietors, labor unions, or employees may contribute funds for		
19	medical expenses.		
20	(c)	The task force shall submit to the legislature,	
21	through the department of labor and industrial relations, its		
22	findings and recommendations, including any proposed

- 1 legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
- 2 the 2011 regular session.
- 3 (d) The task force shall cease to exist on June 30, 2011.
- 4 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
