A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTION BY MAIL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. In 2004, Hawaii had the lowest voter turnout 2 rate for general elections in the nation, and its turnout rate 3 remains in the bottom half of national voter turnout rates. In 4 contrast, Oregon has one of the ten highest voter turnout rates 5 in the nation, with over fifty per cent of eligible voters voting in the 2006 general election. Oregon's vote-by-mail 6 7 system, approved by almost seventy per cent of Oregonians in a 1998 initiative, is credited with improving voter participation 8 9 in Oregon. Oregon's vote-by-mail system is used for all 10 elections and is popular with voters because it empowers the 11 voter and eliminates many of the problems and costs of other 12 voting systems. Ballots are mailed to voters, and the voter is 13 required to return the ballot by mail or by dropping it off at 14 designated sites within a two-week period.

As of 2005, although Oregon was the only state to use a vote-by-mail system for all elections, all states now allow some version of mail-in voting. At least twenty-eight states,



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including Oregon, allow no-excuse absentee voting. The
 legislature finds that a vote-by-mail system has a number of
 advantages over traditional polling.

The purpose of this Act is to require the office of
elections to develop and implement a vote-by-mail pilot program
similar to Oregon's vote-by-mail system. The pilot program
shall be implemented for elections in 2010 in three
representative districts meeting particular criteria.

9 SECTION 2. (a) The office of elections shall develop and 10 implement a vote-by-mail pilot program to replace traditional 11 polling places in certain representative districts for elections 12 in 2010. The vote-by-mail pilot program shall include a 13 requirement that vote-by-mail ballots be received by the close 14 of the polls on election day to ensure that they are counted. 15 The vote-by-mail pilot program shall also include voter 16 education materials relating to the pilot program for eligible 17 voters who reside in pilot program districts.

18 (b) The office of elections shall implement the pilot
19 program in three representative districts selected by the office
20 of elections according to the following criteria:

21 (1) One representative district shall be the district that
22 the office of elections determines to be a rural



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1 district with the combination of lowest absentee 2 turnout rate and lowest voter turnout rate out of all 3 state rural districts for the two most recent general 4 elections; provided that if more than one 5 representative district qualifies under this 6 paragraph, the office of elections may select the 7 representative district it deems to be the most 8 suitable for the purposes of this Act. In determining 9 whether a representative district is a rural district, the office of elections shall select a representative 10 11 district with more than half of its land classified as 12 rural land by the state land use commission under 13 section 205-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes; 14 (2)One representative district shall be the district that 15 the office of elections determines to be an urban 16 district with the combination of lowest absentee 17 turnout rate and lowest voter turnout rate out of all state urban districts for the two most recent general 18 19 elections; provided that if more than one 20 representative district qualifies under this 21 paragraph, the office of elections may select the 22 representative district it deems to be the most



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suitable for the purposes of this Act. In determining whether a representative district is an urban district, the office of elections shall select a representative district with more than half of its land classified as urban land by the state land use commission under section 205-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes;

8 (3) One representative district shall be that district 9 that the office of elections determines to have a 10 voter turnout rate closest to that of the overall 11 state voter turnout rate during the two most recent 12 general elections; provided that if more than one 13 representative district qualifies under this 14 paragraph, the office of elections may select the 15 representative district it deems to be the most 16 suitable for the purposes of this Act; and 17 (4)If the same district meets the criteria set forth in 18 paragraph (3) and either paragraph (1) or (2), the 19 office of elections shall select the next best 20 qualifying district from a different county to 21 participate in the pilot program to fulfill the 22 criteria set forth in paragraph (3).



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1	(c)	Upon the selection of the representative districts to	
2	participa	te in the pilot program, but not later than January	
3	2010, the	office of elections shall submit a preliminary report	
4	to the legislature that includes:		
5	(1)	Identification of the three representative districts	
6		selected by the office of elections to participate in	
7		the pilot program, including a description of the	
8		method used to select the districts;	
9	(2)	The current status of implementation of the pilot	
10		program; and	
11	(3)	A brief description of operational problems or legal	
12		impediments that have affected or are anticipated to	
13		affect implementation of the pilot program.	
14	(d)	Upon the conclusion of the 2010 general election, but	
15	not later	than the convening of the legislative regular session	
16	of 2011,	the office of elections shall submit a report to the	
17	legislature that includes:		
18	(1)	Voter demographics, turnout, and other statistical	
19		information, as deemed necessary by the chief election	
20		officer, to accurately assess the efficacy of the	
21		pilot program for each selected representative	
22		district;	



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1	(2)	Efforts made by the office of elections to advertise,
2		educate, and promote the pilot program to enhance the
3		pilot program's chance of success and the cost of
4		those efforts;
5	(3)	Whether the pilot program had any effect on increasing
6		or decreasing voter turnout and absentee turnout and,
7		if so, by how much;
8	(4)	Any operational problems or legal impediments that
9		arose and affected the implementation or operation of
10		the pilot program;
11	(5)	The actual cost of implementing the pilot program,
12		including postage costs;
13	(6)	A recommendation as to whether the pilot program
14		should be made permanent on a limited or statewide
15		basis and, if recommended to be made permanent, a
16		recommendation on what statutory revisions need to be
17		made to fully effectuate the mail-in voting program;
18		and
19	(7)	An estimate on the cost, including postage costs, to
20		continue the pilot program permanently on a limited or
21		statewide basis.



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1 The vote-by-mail pilot program shall be funded by federal 2 funds, when available, and legislative appropriations to the extent that federal funds are not available. The office of 3 4 elections shall use federal funds whenever possible to develop 5 and implement the pilot program. 6 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 7 or so 8 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal biennium 2009-2011 9 to establish a vote-by-mail pilot program for elections in 10 certain representative districts in 2010. 11 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of 12 elections for the purpose of this Act. 13 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2009, and shall be repealed on December 31, 2011. 14 15
