### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HAWAII GROWN PRODUCE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 3 and to read as follows: 4 "§302A-A Farm-to-school program. (a) There is 5 established in the department of education a farm-to-school 6 program. The purpose of the program is to increase procurement 7 of locally-grown fruits and vegetables by public schools. 8 (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the farm-9 to-school program, in consultation as necessary with the 10 departments of health, accounting and general services, and 11 agriculture, shall: 12 (1)Coordinate the identification and development of 13 policies and procedures to implement and evaluate the 14 program; (2) Assist food growers and distributors to market Hawaii-15 16 grown produce to schools by informing them of food 17 procurement opportunities, bid procedures, school 18 purchasing criteria, and other requirements; SB LRB 09-1348.doc



1	(3)	Assist schools to connect with local growers and
2		distributors by informing the schools of the sources
3		and availability of Hawaii-grown produce as well as
4		the nutritional, environmental, and economic benefits
5		of purchasing Hawaii-grown produce;
6	(4)	Identify and recommend mechanisms that will increase
7		the predictability of sales for producers and the
8		adequacy of supply for purchasers;
9	(5)	Identify and encourage the use of existing curricula,
10		programs, and publications to educate students on the
11		nutritional, environmental, and economic benefits of
12		preparing and consuming Hawaii-grown produce;
13	(6)	Support efforts to advance other farm-to-school
14		connections such as farmers markets on school grounds,
15		school gardens, and community-supported agriculture;
16		and
17	(7)	Seek additional private and public sector funds to
18		leverage any appropriations.
19	(C)	As used in this section, "Hawaii-grown produce" means
20	fruits and	l vegetables grown or raised in the State that are
21	unprocesse	ed, minimally processed, flash frozen, or otherwise
22	prepared a	and handled to maintain its fresh nature while
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1	providing convenience to the user. Producing minimally
2	processed foods means cleaning, washing, cutting, or portioning.
3	<u>§302A-B</u> Hawaii-grown fresh fruit and vegetable program.
4	(a) The Hawaii-grown fresh fruit and vegetable program is
5	created in the department of education. The purpose of the
6	program is to facilitate consumption of locally produced
7	nutritious snacks in order to improve student health and expand
8	the market for locally grown fresh produce.
9	(b) As used in this section, "Hawaii-grown fresh fruits
10	and vegetables" means fruits and vegetables grown or raised in
11	this State that are unprocessed, minimally processed, flash
12	frozen, or otherwise prepared and handled to maintain the fresh
13	nature of the fruits and vegetables while providing convenience
14	to the user. Producing minimally processed foods means
15	cleaning, washing, cutting, or portioning.
16	(c) The program shall increase the number of school
17	children with access to Hawaii-grown fresh fruits and vegetables
18	and shall be modeled after the United States Department of
19	Agriculture fresh fruit and vegetable program, as described in
20	42 United States Code section 1769(g). Schools receiving funds
21	under the federal fresh fruit and vegetable program are not



1	eligible	for grants under the Hawaii-grown fresh fruit and
2	vegetable	program.
3	(d)	(1) To the extent that state funds are appropriated
4		specifically for this purpose, the department shall
5		solicit applications, conduct a competitive process,
6		and make one- or two-year grants to schools to enable
7		eligible schools to provide free locally grown fresh
8		fruits and vegetables throughout the school day;
9	(2)	When evaluating applications and selecting grantees,
10		the department shall consider and prioritize the
11		following factors:
12		(A) The applicant's plan for ensuring the use of
13		Hawaii-grown fruits and vegetables within the
14		program;
15		(B) The applicant's plan for incorporating nutrition
16		and related agricultural stewardship and
17		environmental education into the curriculum; and
18		(C) The applicant's plan for establishing
19		partnerships with state, local, and private
20		entities to further the program's objectives,
21		such as helping the school acquire, handle,
22		store, and distribute fresh fruits and



1		vegetables, and developing educational components
2		around nutrition and agricultural stewardship.
3	<u>(e)</u>	The department:
4	(1)	Shall give funding priority to applicant schools with
5		any of grades kindergarten through eight that
6		participate in the national school lunch program and
7		have fifty per cent or more of their students eligible
8		for free or reduced price meals under the federal
9		National School Lunch Act;
10	(2)	May award grants to applicant schools with less than
11		fifty per cent of the students eligible for free or
12		reduced price meals if any funds remain after all
13		eligible priority applicant schools have been awarded
14		grants, the department.
15	(f)	The department shall develop and track specific,
16	quantifia	ble outcome measures of the grant program, such as the
17	number of	students served by the program and the dollar value of
18	purchase	orders to local farmers resulting from the program.
19	With assi	stance from the department of agriculture, the
20	departmen	t shall track the development of farm-to-school
21	partnersh	ips that extend beyond the cafeteria.



1	<b>§302A-C</b> School gardens. (a) All schools are authorized
2	to grow food in school gardens for consumption in their school
3	lunch and as part of Hawaii-grown fresh fruit and vegetable
4	programs.
5	(b) The department may adopt rules under chapter 91 to
6	facilitate the implementation of this section.
7	(c) Every school garden program shall educate students
8	about organic and conventional growing methods."
9	SECTION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
11	and to read as follows:
12	" <u>\$346-</u> Farmers to food banks pilot program. (a) The
13	department of human services shall establish a pilot program in
14	cooperation with the department of agriculture to contract with
15	local farmers to provide Hawaii-grown produce to low-income
16	people through designated food banks. The pilot program shall
17	operate in select pilot site communities statewide.
