# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ARCHAEOLOGY.

# BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that historic 2 preservation in Hawaii is presently in a condition of 3 unprecedented confusion and disarray, making it nearly 4 impossible for the State to meet its cultural obligations and 5 legislative mandates to manage historical properties for the 6 benefit of the various descendent communities. The discovery, 7 identification, and preservation of archaeological sites, human 8 burial sites, and other historic properties are increasingly 9. threatened.

10 The recent acceleration of development, which often 11 requires cultural resource management, shows no signs of abating 12 in the foreseeable future. The legislature further finds that 13 with careful planning and open lines of communication among 14 archaeologists, developers, descendent communities, and state 15 officials, few properties and sites would be disturbed. When 16 disturbance does occur, response must be in a culturally sensitive and productive fashion. 17



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1 The legislature further finds that the severe shortage of 2 historic preservation professionals, particularly credentialed 3 archaeologists, exacerbates the historic preservation crisis. Protecting the State's cultural and historic heritage requires 4 5 support of university programs to train the next generation of 6 archaeologists with solid professional skills, ethical standards, and cultural knowledge. 7 8 The purpose of this Act is to build upon the master of arts 9 graduate program in applied archaeology at the University of 10 Hawaii at Manoa, with the intent of reaching students and 11 professionals on the neighbor island campuses as well. 12 SECTION 2. Chapter 304A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13 amended by adding a new section to part IV, subpart M, to be 14 appropriately designated and to read as follows: 15 "§304A-Applied archaeology program; support. (a) The 16 University of Hawaii at Manoa shall offer a master of arts 17 degree in applied archaeology to qualified candidates upon 18 completion of the program. Enrollment in the applied archaeology graduate program 19 (b) 20 shall give priority to students who work or intend to work 21 immediately upon graduation in Hawaii's public and private

3	(c)	The curriculum of the applied archaeology graduate	
4	program,	among other courses as determined by the department of

7	(1)	Academic and technical aspects of archaeology;	
8	(2)	Practical training necessary to become competent	
9		public and private sector archaeologists in cultural	
10		resource management and historic preservation;	
11	(3)	Legal and regulatory contexts of cultural resource	
12		management archaeology;	
13	(4)	Methods of conducting field studies of archaeological	
14		sites and other historic properties; and	
15	(5)	Analysis and preparation of written reports pursuant	
16		to cultural resource management studies that may be	
17		required by law.	
18	(d)	Students awarded a master of arts degree in the	
19	applied archaeology graduate program shall possess national		
20	level competencies needed to staff the various private cultural		
21	resource management firms and government agencies that employ		



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1	cultural resource management archaeologists and other historic		
2	preservation professionals.		
3	(e) The University of Hawaii at Manoa shall establish a		
4	full-time equivalent non-tenure tract position for an		
5	archaeologist-in-residence; full-time equivalent tenure tract		
6	position for a Pacific archaeologist; four graduate internships		
7	per year in applied archaeology; and one program coordinator for		
8	the master of arts in applied archaeology.		
9	(f) The University of Hawaii at Manoa shall develop a plan		
10	to establish course offerings through the applied archaeological		
11	program at campuses on the neighbor islands."		
12	SECTION 3. In conjunction with the applied archaeological		
13	program established in section 2, the state historic		
14	preservation division shall plan, conduct, and otherwise sponsor		
15	two community workshops in 2009-2010 to:		
16	(1) Revive the 2006 state historic preservation division's		
17	archaeological working group, compile and amend its		
18	recommendations, and complete its report; provided		
19	that the working group shall report to the legislature		
20	no later than twenty days prior to the convening of		
21	the regular session of 2010 on the outcomes as		
22	contained in the report;		



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1	(2)	Expand the membership of the working group to include
2		a broader cross-section of the State's historic
3		preservation community, such as, Kamehameha Schools,
4		the office of Hawaiian affairs, archaeologists from
5		private cultural resource management firms, and
6		archaeologists and historic preservation officials of
7		state, county, and federal agencies;
8	(3)	Identify professional development and certification
9		requirements that should be established for personnel
10		of the state historic preservation division and
11		contractors of the division; and
12	(4)	Identify possible training and educational
13		opportunities to be offered to burial council members
14		to assist them in performing their duties.
15	SECT	ION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
16	revenues o	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
17	much there	eof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2009-2010 and
18	the same s	sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
<u>19</u>	year 2010.	-2011 for the applied archaeology graduate program at
20	the Univer	rsity of Hawaii at Manoa.
21	The s	sums appropriated shall be expended by the University

22 of Hawaii at Manoa for the purposes of this Act.



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1 SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.

2 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;

3 provided that section 4 shall take effect on July 1, 2009.
