### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FORFEITURE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The Hawaii supreme court in the case of
 Carlisle v. One (1) Boat, et al. (No. 26995, November 17, 2008),
 held that the State's forfeiture laws as applied to natural
 resource violations do not provide the requisite specificity to
 statutorily authorize forfeiture claims by the State.

6 The purpose of this Act is to clarify that the forfeiture
7 laws apply to violations of conservation and resources statutes
8 and rules and to the protection of caves, historic preservation,
9 and the Kaho'olawe island reserve.

10 SECTION 2. Section 187A-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
11 amended to read as follows:

12 "§187A-5 Rules. (a) Subject to chapter 91, the 13 department shall adopt, amend, and repeal rules for and 14 concerning the protection and propagation of introduced and 15 transplanted aquatic life, or the conservation and allocation of 16 the natural supply of aquatic life in any area. The rules may 17 include the following:



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1	(1)	Size limits;	
2	(2)	Bag limits;	
3	(3)	Open and closed fishing seasons;	
4	(4)	Specifications and numbers of fishing or taking gear	
5		which may be used or possessed; and	
6	(5)	Prescribe and limit the kind and amount of bait that	
7		may be used in taking aquatic life, and the conditions	
8		for entry into areas for taking aquatic life.	
9	(b)	The rules may vary from one county to another and may	
10	specify c	ertain days of the week or certain hours of the day in	
11	designating open seasons. All rules shall have the force and		
12	effect of	law. Any person who violates any of the rules adopted	
13	pursuant to this section shall be [guilty]:		
14	(1)	<u>Guilty</u> of a petty misdemeanor [and upon conviction	
15		thereof shall-be punished];	
16	(2)	Punished as provided by section 188-70[-], upon	
17		conviction; and	
18	(3)	Subject to forfeiture proceedings under chapter 712A."	
19	SECTION 3. Section 188-70, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
20	amended b	y amending subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows:	
21	"(a)	Any person violating any provision of this chapter,	
22	excepting	section 188-23, or any rule adopted pursuant thereto,	
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1 is guilty of a petty misdemeanor and, in addition to any other 2 penalties, shall be fined not less than: 3 (1) \$100 for a first offense; 4 \$200 for a second offense; and (2)5 \$500 for a third or subsequent offense. (3) 6 Forfeiture proceedings under chapter 712A shall apply to a 7 violation of this subsection. 8 Any person violating section 188-23, is guilty of a (b) 9 class C felony and shall be sentenced pursuant to chapter 706; 10 provided that the court, in addition to any term of imprisonment 11 or any other terms and conditions of probation, shall order the 12 defendant to pay a fine of not less than \$1,000. Notwithstanding section 706-669 and any other law to the 13 14 contrary, any person in violation of subsection (b), as a first 15 offense, shall be sentenced to a mandatory minimum period of 16 imprisonment without possibility of parole for thirty days. 17 Repeat offenders shall be sentenced pursuant to chapter 706. 18 Forfeiture proceedings under chapter 712A shall apply to a 19 violation of this subsection." 20 SECTION 4. Section 712A-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

21 amended to read as follows:



1 "§712A-4 Covered offenses. Offenses for which property is subject to forfeiture under this chapter are: 2 3 (a) All offenses which specifically authorize forfeiture; 4 Murder, kidnapping, gambling, criminal property (b) damage, robbery, bribery, extortion, theft, 5 6 unauthorized entry into motor vehicle, burglary, money 7 laundering, trademark counterfeiting, insurance fraud, 8 promoting a dangerous, harmful, or detrimental drug, 9 commercial promotion of marijuana, unlawful 10 methamphetamine trafficking, manufacturing of a 11 controlled substance with a child present, promoting 12 child abuse, or electronic enticement of a child which 13 is chargeable as a felony offense under state law; 14 (C) The manufacture, sale, or distribution of a controlled 15 substance in violation of chapter 329, promoting 16 detrimental drugs or intoxicating compounds, promoting 17 pornography, promoting pornography for minors, or 18 promoting prostitution, which is chargeable as a felony or misdemeanor offense, but not as a petty 19 20 misdemeanor, under state law; [and]



1	(d)	The attempt, conspiracy, solicitation, coercion, or
2		intimidation of another to commit any offense for
3		which property is subject to forfeiture[-]; and
4	<u>(e)</u>	Offenses under Title 12 and any rules adopted
5		thereunder, whether or not forfeiture is specified as
6		a penalty in the applicable chapter.
7	<u>(f)</u>	Offenses under chapters 6D, 6E, and 6K and any rules
8		adopted thereunder, whether or not forfeiture is
9		specified as a penalty in the applicable chapter."
10	SECTI	ION 5. Section 712A-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
11	amended by	amending subsection (1) to read as follows:
12	"(1)	The following is subject to forfeiture:
13	(a)	Property described in a statute authorizing
14		forfeiture;
15	(b)	Property used or intended for use in the commission
16		of, attempt to commit, or conspiracy to commit a
17		covered offense, or which facilitated or assisted such
18		activity;
19	(C)	Any firearm which is subject to forfeiture under any
20		other subsection of this section or which is carried
21		during, visible, or used in furtherance of the
22		commission, attempt to commit, or conspiracy to commit
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1 a covered offense, or any firearm found in proximity 2 to contraband or to instrumentalities of an offense; 3 (d) Contraband or untaxed cigarettes in violation of 4 chapter 245, shall be seized and summarily forfeited 5 to the State without regard to the procedures set 6 forth in this chapter; 7 Any proceeds or other property acquired, maintained, (e) 8 or produced by means of or as a result of the 9 commission of the covered offense; 10 (f) Any property derived from any proceeds which were 11 obtained directly or indirectly from the commission of 12 a covered offense; 13 (g) Any interest in, security of, claim against, or 14 property or contractual right of any kind affording a 15 source of influence over any enterprise which has been 16 established, participated in, operated, controlled, or conducted in order to commit a covered offense; 17 18 All books, records, bank statements, accounting (h) 19 records, microfilms, tapes, computer data, or other 20 data which are used, intended for use, or which 21 facilitated or assisted in the commission of a covered



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1		offense, or which document the use of the proceeds of			
2		a covered offense[-];			
3	<u>(i)</u>	Any property that is the subject of offenses under			
4		Title 12 and any rules adopted thereunder, whether or			
5		not forfeiture is specified as a penalty in the			
6		applicable chapter; and			
7	<u>(j)</u>	Any property that is the subject of offenses under			
8		chapters 6D, 6E, and 6K and any rules adopted			
9		thereunder, whether or not forfeiture is specified as			
10		a penalty in the applicable chapter."			
11	SECT	ION 6. This Act does not affect rights and duties that			
12	matured,	penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were			
13	begun, be	fore its effective date.			
14	SECT	ION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed			
15	and stric	ken. New statutory material is underscored.			
16	SECT	ION 8. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
