A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STATEWIDE TRAFFIC CODE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that section 291C-65,
- 2 Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires drivers to yield the right-of-
- 3 way upon immediate approach of an authorized emergency vehicle
- 4 making use of audible and visual signals until the authorized
- 5 emergency vehicle has passed.
- 6 The purpose of this Act is to require the driver of a
- 7 vehicle approaching a stationary authorized emergency vehicle
- 8 that is displaying emergency lights, or a stationary tow truck
- 9 that is displaying flashing amber warning lights, to approach
- 10 with due caution and, absent any other direction by a police
- 11 officer, proceed either to:
- 12 (1) Make a lane change into an available lane, as
- specified, or;
- 14 (2) If that action would be unsafe or impracticable, slow
- to a reasonable and prudent speed that is safe.

1	SECTION 2. Chapter 291C, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	"§291C- Authorized emergency vehicles; tow trucks;
5	emergency incident zones. (a) For the purposes of this
6	section:
7	"Emergency incident zone" means an area on a highway that
8	is within five hundred feet of, and in the direction of travel
9	of, a stationary authorized emergency vehicle that has its
10	emergency lights activated or a stationary tow truck that is
11	displaying flashing amber warning lights; provided that traffic
12	in the opposite lanes of the highway is not in an "emergency
13	incident zone."
14	(b) The driver of a vehicle approaching an emergency
15	incident zone shall approach with due caution and, before
16	passing in a lane immediately adjacent to the authorized
17	emergency vehicle or tow truck, absent any other direction by a
18	<pre>police officer, shall:</pre>
19	(1) Make a lane change into an available lane not
20	immediately adjacent to the authorized emergency
21	vehicle or tow truck with due regard for safety and

1		traffic conditions, if practicable and not prohibited
2		by law; or
3	(2)	If the action in paragraph (1) would be unsafe or
4		impracticable, slow to a reasonable and prudent speed
5		that is safe for existing weather, road, and vehicular
6		or pedestrian traffic conditions.
7	(c)	Any person who violates this section shall be fined
8	not more	than \$50."
9	SECT	ION 3. Section 291C-135, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended t	o read as follows:
11	"§29	1C-135 Tow trucks; signage [and], insurance, and

2	charges, may be collected by the tow operator as a
3	result of the tow or as a condition of the release of
4	the towed vehicle. Any person, including the
5	registered owner, lien holder, or insurer of the
6	vehicle, who has been injured by the tow operator's
7	failure to comply with this [section] paragraph is
8	entitled to sue for damages sustained. If a judgment
9	is obtained by the plaintiff, the court shall award
10	the plaintiff a sum of not less than \$1,000 or
11	threefold damages sustained by the plaintiff,
12	whichever sum is greater, and reasonable attorney's
13	fees and costs.
14	This [section] subsection shall not apply to a county that has
15	adopted ordinances regulating towing operations.
16	(b) Tow trucks used to tow disabled vehicles from an
17	emergency incident zone as defined in section 291C- shall be
18	equipped with flashing amber warning lamps; provided that this
19	subsection shall not apply to a tractor-trailer combination."

- 2 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Highway Safety; Emergency Vehicles and Tow Trucks

Description:

Requires drivers approaching a stationary authorized emergency vehicle that is displaying emergency lights, or a stationary tow truck that is displaying flashing amber warning lights, to approach with due caution and make a lane change into an available lane or if that action would be unsafe or impracticable, slow to a reasonable and safe speed.
