#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTIONS BY MAIL.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by 2 adding a chapter to be appropriately designated and to read as 3 follows: 4 "CHAPTER 5 ELECTION BY MAIL 6 -1 Definitions. As used in this chapter, unless the 7 context clearly requires otherwise: 8 "Ballot" means a ballot as defined in section 11-1 that is 9 used in an election by mail. 10 "Chief election officer" means the individual defined in 11 section 11-1. 12 "Clerk" shall have the same meaning as defined in section 13 11-1.14 "County" shall have the same meaning as defined in section
- "Election" shall have the same meaning as defined in
  section 11-1, and shall include presidential elections.

- 1 "Election by mail" means an election conducted exclusively
- 2 by mail-in-ballot.
- 3 "Mail-in-ballot" means any ballot used by a voter to vote
- 4 by mail in any election.
- 5 "Voter" shall have the same meaning as defined in section
- 6 11-1.
- 7 § -2 Elections to be conducted by mail. Beginning with
- 8 the primary election of 2010, all elections shall be conducted
- 9 by mail. Part VIII of chapter 11, relating to ballots, shall
- 10 apply to this chapter.
- 11 § -3 Procedures for conducting election by mail. (a)
- 12 Except as provided in subsections (b) and (c), the county clerk
- 13 shall mail by nonforwardable mail:
- 14 (1) An official ballot;
- 15 (2) A return identification envelope; and
- 16 (3) A ballot envelope;
- 17 to each registered voter sufficiently in advance of the election
- 18 to allow adequate time for processing the returns by the date of
- 19 the election.
- 20 (b) If the county clerk determines that a voter does not
- 21 receive daily mail service from the United States Postal

- 1 Service, the county clerk shall mail by forwardable mail to the
- 2 last known address of the voter:
- 3 (1) An official ballot;
- 4 (2) A return identification envelope; and
- 5 (3) A ballot envelope;
- 6 sufficiently in advance of the election to allow adequate time
- 7 for delivery of the ballot and the processing of the returns by
- 8 the date of the election.
- 9 (c) If the voter requests a ballot be mailed outside of
- 10 the State of Hawaii, the county clerk shall mail by
- 11 nonforwardable mail:
- 12 (1) An official ballot:
- (2) A return identification envelope; and
- 14 (3) A ballot envelope;
- 15 sufficiently in advance of the election to allow adequate time
- 16 for delivery of the ballot and the processing of the returns by
- 17 the date of the election.
- 18 (d) Upon receipt of a ballot by mail, the voter may:
- 19 (1) Mark the ballot;
- 20 (2) Sign the return identification envelope supplied with
- 21 the ballot; and
- 22 (3) Comply with the instructions provided with the ballot.

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- 1 The voter shall return the marked ballot to the county clerk by
- 2 the United States Postal Service or by depositing the ballot at
- 3 any place of deposit designated by the chief election officer or
- 4 county clerk.
- 5 (e) The return identification envelope supplied pursuant
- 6 to subsection (a), (b) or (c) shall contain a statement to be
- 7 subscribed to by the voter that affirms the fact that the voter
- 8 is the person voting, the instruction that the voter's ballot
- 9 will be valid only if the affirmation statement is signed, and
- 10 any other information prescribed by the rules adopted by the
- 11 chief election officer.
- 12 (f) The mailed distribution and return of ballots in an
- 13 election by mail shall be at no cost to the voter. The State
- 14 and the counties shall share in the cost of postage associated
- 15 with the distribution and return of ballots pursuant to sections
- 16 11-182, 11-183, and 11-184, if the costs are not covered by the
- 17 federal government.
- 18 § -4 Replacement ballots. (a) In an election by mail,
- 19 a voter may obtain a replacement ballot. To vote by a
- 20 replacement ballot, the voter shall complete and sign a
- 21 replacement ballot request form. The request for a replacement

- 1 ballot may be made by mail, in person, or by other means
- 2 designated by the chief election officer.
- 3 (b) Upon receipt of a request for a replacement ballot,
- 4 the county clerk or a designee appointed by the clerk shall:
- 5 (1) Verify the registration of the voter and ensure that
- **6** another ballot has not been returned to the voter;
- 7 (2) Make a notation on the list of registered voters that
- 8 the voter has requested a replacement ballot;
- 9 (3) Mark the return identification envelope so that it may
- 10 be identified as a replacement ballot; and
- 11 (4) Issue a replacement ballot.
- 12 § -5 Counting of ballots. (a) The method of preparing
- 13 ballots for counting may begin no sooner than the day of the
- 14 election. In the presence of official observers, counting center
- 15 employees may begin to count the ballots at any time on the day
- 16 of the election.
- 17 (b) A mailed ballot shall be counted if:
- 18 (1) It is received by the county clerk not later than the
- end of the period determined by the chief election
- 20 officer;
- 21 (2) It is received in the return identification envelope;

- 1 (3) The envelope is signed by the voter to whom the ballot
  2 is issued;
- 3 (4) The voter is a registered voter who has complied with
  4 section 11-15; and
- (5) The signature of the voter is verified pursuant tosubsection (c).
- 7 (c) The county clerk, or a designee appointed by the 8 county clerk, shall verify the signature on the return
- 9 identification envelope.
- 10 (d) Upon receipt of a voted replacement ballot, the county
- 11 clerk or a designated appointee shall verify that a completed
- 12 and signed replacement ballot request form has been received by
- 13 the county clerk or is included with the voted replacement
- 14 ballot. If a request form has been completed and signed by the
- 15 voter and received by the county clerk, the county clerk or a
- 16 designated appointee shall process the ballot. If the
- 17 replacement ballot request form is not completed or signed by
- 18 the voter or not received by the county clerk, the county clerk
- 19 or a designated appointee shall not process the ballot.
- 20 § -6 Rules. The chief election officer may adopt rules
- 21 as authorized under section 11-4 for purposes of this chapter."

- 1 SECTION 2. Section 11-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended as follows:
- 3 1. By amending the definition of "ballot" to read:
- 4 ""Ballot", a ballot, including an absentee ballot, is a
- 5 written or printed, or partly written and partly printed, paper
- 6 or papers containing the names of persons to be voted for, the
- 7 office to be filled, and the questions or issues to be voted on.
- 8 "Ballot" includes a ballot used in an election by mail under
- 9 chapter . A ballot may consist of one or more cards or pieces
- 10 of paper, or one face of a card or piece of paper, or a portion
- 11 of the face of a card or piece of paper, depending on the number
- 12 of offices, candidates to be elected thereto, questions or
- issues to be voted on, and the voting system in use. [It shall
- 14 also include the face of the mechanical voting machine when
- 15 arranged with cardboard or other material within the ballot
- 16 frames, containing the names of the candidates and questions to
- 17 be voted on.]"
- 18 2. By amending the definition of "voting system" to read:
- ""Voting system", refers to the use of paper
- 20 ballots[, electronic ballot cards, voting machines, or any system
- 21 by which votes are cast and counted.] in an election by mail as
- 22 provided under chapter ."

In the event of a flood, tsunami, earthquake, volcanic eruption, 1 2 high wind, or other natural disaster, occurring prior to an 3 election, that makes a precinct inaccessible, the chief election 4 officer or county clerk in the case of county elections may 5 consolidate precincts within a representative district. If the 6 extent of damage caused by any natural disaster is such that the 7 ability of voters, in any precinct, district, or county, to 8 exercise their right to vote is substantially impaired, the 9 chief election officer or county clerk in the case of county **10** elections may require the registered voters of the affected 11 precinct to vote by absentee ballot pursuant to section 15-2.5 12 and may postpone the conducting of an election in the affected 13 precinct for no more than twenty one days; provided that any 14 such postponement shall not affect the conduct of the election, 15 tabulation, or distribution of results for those precincts, 16 districts, or counties not designated for postponement. #### Description:

Requires all federal, state, and county elections to be conducted by mail voting system. Makes appropriation.
