## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING ALL HAWAII PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOLS TO MAKE DATA-DRIVEN AND SYSTEMATIC IMPROVEMENTS TO THEIR SCHOOL PROGRAMS, CULTURE, AND STRUCTURE TO IMPROVE COLLEGE READINESS FOR ALL STUDENTS.

WHEREAS, Hawaii's citizens and community leaders place a 1 high priority on quality K-12 education, and the Board of 2 Education and Superintendent of Education advance this 3 commitment toward excellence by fostering student achievement, 4 school improvement, and community involvement in education based 5 on high expectations and challenging standards; and 6

WHEREAS, through funding by the Bill & Melinda Gates 8 Foundation, the Educational Policy Improvement Center (EPIC) has 9 developed a college readiness model composed of the following 10 four dimensions: 11

Key Cognitive Strategies describe the ways of thinking (1)that are necessary for college-level work, including but not limited to problem-solving, inquisitiveness, precision/accuracy, interpretation, reasoning, research, and intellectual openness;

Key Content Knowledge refers to the need for students (2) to master writing skills, algebraic concepts, key foundational content, and "big ideas" from core subjects in order to be college ready;

- Academic Behaviors consist largely of study skills and (3) 24 self-monitoring, including but not limited to time 25 management, awareness of one's current level of 26 mastery, and selection of learning strategies; and 27
- (4)Contextual Skills and Awareness, or "college 29 knowledge, " refers to the understanding of college 30 admissions processes, college culture, tuition and



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financial aid, and college-level academic 1 2 expectations; and 3 4 WHEREAS, EPIC selected and visited thirty-eight high schools from throughout the United States representing a diverse 5 cross-section of schools from nearly two hundred schools 6 7 nominated by organizations such as the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, the Coalition of Essential Schools, Diploma Plus, 8 The Education Trust-West, EdVisions Schools, High Schools that 9 Work, Jobs for the Future, Volunteers of America, and 10 Advancement Via Individual Determination, that had consistently 11 12 graduated college-ready students from underrepresented groups; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, the EPIC study of the thirty-eight high schools identified key themes related to how participating schools 16 foster college readiness including: 17 18 Creating and maintaining a college-going culture in 19 (1)the school; 20 21 (2) Emphasizing key cognitive strategies such as 22 23 reasoning, problem solving, and research; 24 Holding high expectations for all students, then (3) 25 26 providing differing degrees of support based on student need; 27 28 (4)Creating a core academic program that is aligned with 29 and leads to college readiness by the end of the 30 twelfth grade; 31 32 (5) Making the senior year meaningful and challenging, 33 keeping all students fully engaged; 34 35 (6) Reducing course selection choice in favor of college-36 focused offerings, particularly for first-generation 37 college attenders; 38 39 Creating assignments and grading policies that more (7) 40 closely approximate college expectations each 41 successive year of high school; 42 43



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1 (8) Promoting key self-management skills and providing students feedback on the development of these skills; 2 3 4 (9) Preparing students for the complexity of applying to college and the academic and social differences 5 between high school and college; and 6 7 8 (10)Building partnerships with and connections to postsecondary programs and institutions; and 9 10 WHEREAS, several Hawaii public high schools have received 11 federal Smaller Learning Communities Program grants and are 12 working on creating college readiness opportunities for all 13 students at their schools; and 14 15 16 WHEREAS, all public high schools can participate in Running Start, a P-20 initiative at the University of Hawaii that 17 encourages high school students to enroll in college courses 18 while they are still in high school; and 19 20 WHEREAS, the Advancement Via Individual Determination 21 22 program is available to middle schools and high schools to 23 encourage the "average" student to continue to college; and 24 WHEREAS, public high schools can choose to participate in 25 training and site visits offered by High Schools that Work for a 26 nominal fee; and 27 28 WHEREAS, each high school's school community council 29 reviews, gives input to, and recommends approval of high school 30 academic financial plans; and 31 32 WHEREAS, each high school has developed a network of 33 community support including businesses, parents, the military, 34 and other community organizations; now, therefore, 35 36 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth 37 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the 38 39 House of Representatives concurring, that all public high schools and their school community councils are requested to 40 review EPIC's college readiness model and the key themes 41 described above that are followed by the thirty-eight model high 42 43 schools to foster college readiness in their students; and 44



BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all public high schools and their school community councils are requested to assess the extent to which their high school's program, culture, and structure are in line with those identified by EPIC's college readiness model, and discuss and decide what improvements need to be made at their high school to make their high school more college ready for all students; and

9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all public high schools and 10 their school community councils are requested to include the 11 improvements that they identify to better prepare their students 12 for college, in the academic and financial plan for their 13 respective schools for the 2011-2012 school year; and 14

15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Education is 16 requested to report to the Legislature no later than twenty days 17 prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2011, the 18 extent to which high schools and their school community councils 19 have:

- Reviewed EPIC's college readiness model and the key themes followed by the thirty-eight model high schools;
- (2) Evaluated their high school's college readiness; and
- (3) Are including appropriate changes in the school's academic and financial plan; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Superintendent of
Education, the Chairperson of the Board of Education, all public
high school principals, and all chairpersons of school community
councils for public high schools in Hawaii.

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
