SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE HAWAII STATE LEGISLATURE TO CONVENE A HAWAII HEALTH CARE SUMMIT TO DEVELOP A STRATEGIC AND COMPREHENSIVE PLAN FOR HEALTH CARE IN HAWAII.

1 WHEREAS, according to the State Scorecard published in 2007
2 by The Commonwealth Fund, Hawaii ranked number one among the
3 states in health system performance, is a leader in reforming
4 and improving its health system, and has one of the lowest
5 uninsured rates in the nation; and

7 WHEREAS, life expectancy at birth in Hawaii is among the 8 longest in the nation. In 2000, the most recent year for which 9 state estimates are available, a person born in Hawaii had a 10 life expectancy of eighty years, three years longer than the 11 national average; and

WHEREAS, survey data collected by the federal government 13 that compare private employer-sponsored health insurance 14 premiums in Hawaii with those for the country as a whole 15 reported that, as of 2003, Hawaii's premium for single coverage 16 averaged thirteen per cent below the average premium charged 17 across the nation as a whole, and family coverage averaged 18 nearly fifteen per cent below the national average. Studies 19 conducted by private groups since 2003 have found that Hawaii 20 premiums remain low compared to the national average; and 21 22

WHEREAS, Hawaii has the third lowest Medicare cost per
capita in the nation, spending a mere \$5,708 per Medicare
enrollee compared to the District of Columbia's high expenditure
of \$9,154 per enrollee; and

28 WHEREAS, Hawaii has a robust network of federally qualified 29 community health centers that provides quality health care to 30 more than one hundred thousand uninsured persons; and 31

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WHEREAS, however, Hawaii hospitals have lost \$150,000,000
 in the last year, primarily due to uncompensated care and low
 Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement rates that do not cover the
 costs of health care; and

6 WHEREAS, hospitals and physicians have reported low 7 reimbursements from insurers; and

9 WHEREAS, private insurers are under severe pressure to
 10 compensate hospitals and physicians through reimbursements to
 11 cover costs shifted from government health programs such as
 12 Medicare and Medicaid; and

WHEREAS, Hawaii has a shortage of beds in its long-term 14 care facilities, resulting in a diminished quality of life for 15 patients obliged to remain in an acute care hospital while 16 waiting to be placed in a long-term care facility, a general 17 unavailability of acute care beds in hospitals that are needed 18 for acute illness or injury but are occupied by persons awaiting 19 long-term care facility placement, and unnecessary stays in 20 high-cost acute care hospitals, the added cost of which is often 21 absorbed by the acute care hospitals; and 22

24 WHEREAS, changes in demographics, the delivery of health 25 care services, low physician salaries, and the escalating costs 26 of education have resulted in severe shortages of physicians, 27 medical specialists, and other health care professionals, 28 particularly in rural areas of the State; and

30 WHEREAS, the costs of emergency and trauma care are 31 escalating and fewer doctors are willing to serve on-call; and 32

33 WHEREAS, natural disasters, such as Hurricane Katrina,
 34 illustrate the need for improving disaster preparedness,
 35 especially in health care; and

WHEREAS, the complexity of health care reform is
demonstrated by the impact that each part of the health care
system has on other parts of the health care system; and

WHEREAS, therefore, a strategic and comprehensive plan for
health care in Hawaii is necessary to develop an effective
solution for health care today and in the future; now,
therefore,



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2 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the 3 4 House of Representatives concurring, that the Hawaii State Legislature is requested to convene a Hawaii Health Care Summit 5 to develop a strategic and comprehensive plan for health care in 6 7 Hawaii; and 8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii Health Care Summit 9 should be a collaborative effort that includes all stakeholders, 10 including representatives from all medical and health care 11 communities, health insurance providers, community health 12 13 centers, hospitals, emergency and trauma care providers, long-term health care providers, Medicare, Medicaid, the John A. 14 Burns School of Medicine, local business interests, and state 15 16 agencies; and 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii Health Care Summit 18 19 should consist of twenty-six members as follows: 20 21 (1)Six members appointed by the Senate President; 22 (2) Six members appointed by the Speaker of the House of 23 24 Representatives; 25 (3) Three members appointed by the Governor; 26 27 (4) The Chair of the Senate Standing Committee on Health; 28 29 30 The Chair of the House Standing Committee on Health; (5) 31 (6) The Auditor, or the Auditor's designee; 32 33 The Director of Health, or the Director's designee; 34 (7)35

- (8) The Director of Human Services, or the Director's 36 designee; 37
 - The Dean of the University of Hawaii John A. Burns (9) School of Medicine, or the Dean's designee;
- (10)The Chief Executive Officer of the Hawaii Primary Care 42 Association, or the Chief Executive Officer's 43 designee; 44

6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii Health Care Summit 7 shall cease to operate after the adjournment sine die of the 8 2011 Regular Session of the Legislature; and
