SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO ASSESS THE SOCIAL AND FINANCIAL EFFECTS OF REQUIRING HEALTH INSURERS TO PROVIDE COVERAGE FOR WEIGHT MANAGEMENT AND OBESITY TREATMENT FOR CHILDREN.

1 WHEREAS, childhood obesity is a growing concern in the state with 26.9 percent of children ages 10-17 being overweight 2 or obese; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, obesity in children has been associated with the growing incidence in adults of type II diabetes, cardiovascular 6 disease, poor self-esteem, and poor health; and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, a 2004 report estimated that in Hawaii the medical costs attributable to adult obesity totaled \$290,000,000, of 10 which \$30,000,000 was expended by Medicare, \$90,000,000 by 11 12 Medicaid, and \$170,000,000 from other sources; and 13 14 WHEREAS, successful treatment of overweight and obese children may prevent the burden of medical and social problems 15 they face as adults and the associated medical costs to the 16 17 health care system; and 18 19 WHEREAS, pediatricians are usually the first line of 20 intervention regarding an individual child's health; and 21 WHEREAS, pediatricians supplement and enhance the work of 22 23 public health initiatives in raising awareness of the medical and social problems related to being overweight and obese; and 24 25 26 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Pediatric Weight Management Toolkit, 27 designed to help health professionals teach children and parents 28 healthy lifestyle habits, was designed to be used by physicians in response to the growing problem of childhood obesity here in 29 Hawaii; and 30



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WHEREAS, there are significant medical, social, and 1 economic reasons to require health insurance providers to cover 2 treatment of overweight and obese children in this State; and 3 4 WHEREAS, section 23-51, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), 5 requires that: 6 7 8 "[b]efore any legislative measure that 9 mandates health insurance coverage for 10 specific health services, specific diseases, or certain providers of health care services 11 12 part of individual or group health as 13 insurance policies, can be considered, there be concurrent 14 shall resolutions passed 15 requesting the auditor to prepare and submit to the legislature a report that assesses 16 both the social and financial effects of the 17 proposed mandated coverage"; 18 19 and 20 21 WHEREAS, section 23-51, HRS, further provides that "[t]he concurrent resolutions shall designate a specific legislative 22 23 bill that: 24 25 (1) Has been introduced in the legislature; and 26 Includes, at a minimum, information identifying the: (2) 27 28 29 (A) Specific health service, disease, or provider that would be covered; 30 31 32 (B) Extent of coverage; 33 34 (C) Target groups that would be covered; 35 (D) Limits on utilization, if any; and 36 37 38 (E) Standards of care; 39 for purposes of this part, mandated health insurance coverage 40 shall not include mandated optionals"; and 41 42 43 WHEREAS, section 23-52, HRS, further specifies the minimum 44 information required for assessing the social and financial 2010-1680 SCR124 SD1 SMA.doc



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1 impact of the proposed health coverage mandate in the Auditor's 2 report; and

WHEREAS, S.B. No. 794 (2009) mandates coverage for weight management and obesity prevention for children in all individual and group accident and health or sickness insurance policies; and

9 WHEREAS, the Legislature believes that coverage for weight 10 management and obesity prevention for children, as provided in 11 S.B. No. 794 (2009), will substantially reduce illness and 12 assist in the maintenance of good health for the people of this 13 State; now, therefore, 14

15 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the 16 House of Representatives concurring, that the Auditor is 17 requested to conduct an impact assessment report, pursuant to 18 sections 23-51 and 23-52, Hawaii Revised Statutes, of the social 19 and financial impacts of mandating coverage for weight 20 21 management and obesity prevention for children in all individual and group accident and health or sickness insurance policies, as 22 23 provided in S.B. No. 794 (2009); and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to
submit findings and recommendations to the Legislature,
including any necessary implementing legislation, no later than
twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of
2011; and

31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 32 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Auditor and to the 33 Insurance Commissioner, who, in turn, is requested to transmit 34 copies to each insurer in the State that issues health insurance 35 policies.
