SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS TO MEET OR EXCEED OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH ADMINISTRATION POSITION BENCHMARKS FOR WORKPLACE SAFETY AND HEALTH.

WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii operates \under an agreement 1 with the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) in 2 accordance with Section 18 of the Occupational Safety and Health 3 Act of 1970; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations 6 (DLIR) is the designated state agency to administer the program 7 through the Hawaii Occupational Safety and Health Division 8 (HIOSH); and 9 10 WHEREAS, the Hawaii State Plan applies to all private and 11 public sector employees and places of employment in the State 12 other than federal employees, the United States Postal Service, 13 private sector maritime employees, and land that is located 14 exclusively within a federal jurisdiction, all of which are 15 subject to federal OSHA jurisdiction; and 16 17 WHEREAS, Hawaii has adopted the majority of federal OSHA 18 standards verbatim; and 19 20 WHEREAS, critics have questioned the accuracy of falling 21 injuries and illnesses reported by the Bureau of Labor 22 Statistics, and OSHA announced on October 1, 2009, that it 23 instituted the National Emphasis Program on recordkeeping to 24 check the accuracy of employer reporting, especially in the 25 construction industry where it appears that incomplete reporting 26 may be a serious and widespread problem; and 27 28 WHEREAS, the United States Government Accountability Office 29 cites academic studies, which suggest that OSHA misses up to 30 two-thirds of all workplace injuries and illnesses; and 31 32



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WHEREAS, OSHA, due to the jurisdictional distinctions 1 outlined above, is not an equivalent alternative to HIOSH, 2 because OSHA does not cover public workers and does not fully 3 replace State programs; and 4 5 WHEREAS, according to the Construction Injury Law Firms 6 report of February 11, 2010, there are over eleven thousand two 7 hundred disabling construction injuries annually; and 8 9 WHEREAS, of the one hundred eleven fatalities in the 10 construction industry that occurred between 2004 and 2008, 11 twenty-three of those fatalities occurred in Hawaii; and 12 13 WHEREAS, the current DLIR staffing levels do not meet OSHA 14 benchmark levels and despite this, the DLIR continues to reduce 15 staffing levels and thereby jeopardize its ability to fulfill 16 the mission of HIOSH, which exposes Hawaii workers to greater 17 risk; and 18 19 WHEREAS, workplace safety and health, which happens to be 20 the mission of HIOSH, saves lives, prevents the loss of workers' 21 livelihoods, prevents debilitated workers from losing time with 22 their families and recreational endeavors, and reduces costs for 23 employers and society in general; now, therefore, 24 25 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth 26 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the 27 House of Representatives concurring, that the DLIR is strongly 28 urged to meet or exceed OSHA benchmark safety levels for Health 29 Compliance Officers, Safety Compliance Officers, Safety 30 Consultants, Health Consultants, Compliance Assistants, and 31 other positions as required for HIOSH and the DLIR to fulfill 32 its mission in workplace safety and health; and 33 34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the DLIR is requested to report 35 on its progress and plan to meet or exceed OSHA benchmark safety 36 levels to the Legislature no later than twenty days before the 37 convening of the 2011 Regular Session; and 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 40 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor of the 41 State of Hawaii, the Director of Labor and Industrial Relations, 42 the Director of Health, Director of Finance, the Director of 43
