SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII ECONOMIC RESEARCH ORGANIZATION TO CONDUCT AN ECONOMIC ANALYSIS OF THE IMPACT OF THE STATE'S BUDGET CUTS ON CERTAIN PROGRAMS WITHIN THE DEPARTMENTS OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES, AND REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU TO COMPILE AVAILABLE INFORMATION ON THE IMPACT OF THE STATE'S BUDGET CUTS ON CERTAIN PROGRAMS WITHIN THE DEPARTMENTS OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES.

WHEREAS, in 2009, the Governor revealed plans to impose
layoffs and furloughs on state employees in response to the
State's revenue shortfall; and

5 WHEREAS, as a result, the Department of Health and the 6 Department of Human Services are faced with numerous cuts to 7 virtually all divisions and programs within the two departments; 8 and

10 WHEREAS, in response, Senate informational briefings were 11 held in August and September 2009 to gather information on the 12 potential statewide impacts of the anticipated reduction in 13 health and human services; and

15 WHEREAS, the following information regarding the impacts of 16 the budget cuts was presented at the briefings:

- Hawaii's receipt of a \$323,000 federal grant from the Environmental Protection Agency through the Clean Water Act would be in jeopardy;
- (2) Against the backdrop of a doubling of the number of homeless people in the years 1997 to 2009, the Hawaii Housing Authority's homeless program's branch indicated that the cuts would eliminate five of nine staff positions and would put Hawaii's receipt of



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\$16,650,000 in federal Department of Housing and Urban 1 2 Development moneys in jeopardy; 3 4 (3) The deaf and hearing impaired fear the loss of 5 assistance and specialized vocational training; and 6 7 (4) Cuts in youth services would increase gang violence, increase the number of youth in detention facilities, 8 9 and take away services for abused and homeless children; and 10 11 WHEREAS, it has also been reported in the media that the 12 budget cuts will reduce services for: 13 14 15 (1)Individuals with mental illness and disabilities -- those who need help the most; and 16 17 (2) Children, for example, the Healthy Start child abuse 18 19 prevention program was allotted \$10,000,000 in the 20 2008-2009 state budget and was dropped completely from the 2009-2010 budget; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, there is a genuine concern regarding the ramifications of the deep cuts to programs in the Department of 24 25 Health and the Department of Human Services; now, therefore, 26 27 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth 28 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the House of Representatives concurring, that the University of 29 Hawaii Economic Research Organization is requested to conduct an 30 economic analysis of the impact of the State's budget cuts 31 affecting: 32 33 34 The Department of Health's early intervention services (1)35 for children and toddlers program; and 36 37 (2) The Department of Human Services' adult protective 38 services program; and 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization is requested to include in its 41 42 economic analysis referred to in the preceding paragraph: 43



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The dollar amounts, and corresponding percentages, of 1 (1)2 reductions in the departments' budgets, involving 3 state funds and federal funds, if any, for fiscal year 2009-2010 and 2010-2011; 4 5 6 (2) The loss to employees; in terms of wages and benefits, 7 including the cost of unemployment compensation, the effect on employee pensions, and the effect on the 8 9 cost of employees' health insurance; 10 11 (3) The cost to contract providers of health and human 12 services due to funding that has been reduced or eliminated; 13 14 (4) The cost of employing additional health and human 15 services resources to accommodate budget cuts such as 16 17 emergency medical services, hospital stays, intensive 18 care, insurance claims and reimbursements, services to address increased child abuse and neglect, vulnerable 19 adult abuse and neglect, and other related costs; 20 21 (5) 22 The direct economic losses to consumers of affected 23 program services and their families; and 24 (6) 25 Any other relevant economic impacts including 26 macroeconomic effects on the State's economy; and 27 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference 29 Bureau is requested to prepare a separate report compiling available information on the impact of the State's budget cuts 30 affecting: 31 32 33 (1)The Department of Health's early intervention services for children and toddlers program; and 34 35 (2) The Department of Human Services' adult protective 36 37 services program; and 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference Bureau is requested to include in its report referred to in the 40 41 preceding paragraph information, to the extent available, regarding: 42 43



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1 (1)The number of employees providing services in the 2 affected programs before and after the budget cuts; 3 4 (2)The number of employees affected by layoffs and furloughs by position title and island of service; 5 6 7 (3) The number and type services provided before and after 8 implementation of budget cuts; 9 10 Estimates of the number of persons receiving services (4) through the affected programs, including estimates of 11 12 parents or guardians receiving services, before and after the budget cuts; 13 14 (5) The number of health and human services contract 15 providers affected and estimates of contract amounts 16 received, including source of funding, if available, 17 before and after the budget cuts; 18 19 (6) Estimates of any loss or reduction in federal or other 20 21 non-state funding, matching or otherwise, including 22 private sector grants and donations; and 23 24 (7) The negative effects on populations served, including anecdotal information; and 25 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Director of Health and the Director of Human Services are requested to fully cooperate with 28 29 and provide all information requested by the University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization and the Legislative 30 31 Reference Bureau in conducting their respective separate studies; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the University of Hawaii 34 Economic Research Organization and the Legislative Reference 35 36 Bureau are requested to submit their respective reports to the Legislature not later than twenty days prior to the convening of 37 the Regular Session of 2011; and 38 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 41 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Executive Director of the University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization, the 42 43



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Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, the Director of 1 2 Health, and the Director of Human Services. 3

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
