## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF ACCOUNTING AND GENERAL SERVICES TO WORK WITH THE HAWAII LAW ENFORCEMENT MEMORIAL FOUNDATION, THE COUNTY POLICE DEPARTMENTS, THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY, THE UNITED STATES MARSHAL FOR THE DISTRICT OF HAWAII, THE STATE OF HAWAII ORGANIZATION OF POLICE OFFICERS, AND THE CONCERNS OF POLICE SURVIVORS INCORPORATED, TO PLAN AND CONSTRUCT A HAWAII STATE LAW ENFORCEMENT MEMORIAL.

WHEREAS, since the first recorded police death in 1792,
there have been more than eighteen thousand two hundred law
enforcement officers killed in the line of duty in this country;
and

6 WHEREAS, there are more than nine hundred thousand sworn 7 law enforcement officers, twelve per cent of whom are female, 8 now serving in the United States; and

10 WHEREAS, of the officers who sacrificed their lives during 11 the past one hundred years, sixty per cent of them served with 12 municipal departments, eighteen per cent were county officers, 13 fifteen per cent served with state agencies, five per cent were 14 federal officers, and two per cent served with agencies from 15 United States territories; and

WHEREAS, a total of 1,671 law enforcement officers died in the line of duty during the past ten years, an average of one death every fifty-three hours or one hundred sixty-seven deaths per year; and

22 WHEREAS, there were a total of sixty-five law enforcement 23 officers killed in 2009; and 24

WHEREAS, fifty law enforcement officers have lost their 1 lives in the line of duty in Hawaii according to the National 2 Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, several states have erected memorials honoring local law enforcement personnel who have died in the line of 6 7 duty, including California, Oregon, Florida, Michigan, Oklahoma, 8 Missouri, and Kentucky to name a few; and 9 WHEREAS, with the construction of a Hawaii State Law 10 Enforcement Memorial, the Legislature, along with the families 11 of fallen officers, will forever honor their service, which was 12 selflessly given to the people of Hawaii; now, therefore, 13 14 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth 15 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the 16 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of 17 Accounting and General Services is requested to work with 18 representatives, or their designees, from the Hawaii Law 19 Enforcement Memorial Foundation, the county police departments, 20 the Department of Public Safety, the United States Marshals 21 Service, the State of Hawaii Organization of Police Officers, 22 the Concerns of Police Survivors, Inc., the Chairperson of the 23 House of Representatives Committee on Public Safety, and the 24 Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Public Safety and 25 Military Affairs to plan and construct the Hawaii State Law 26 Enforcement Memorial to be located on the grounds of the Hawaii 27 State Capitol; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the Legislature requests that: 30 31 The memorial honor law enforcement personnel who at (1)32 the local, state, and federal levels of government, 33 while in the line of duty, made the ultimate sacrifice 34 to serve and protect the people of Hawaii; 35 36 (2) The memorial call attention to the bravery and 37 everyday public service that law enforcement officers 38 demonstrate in the line of duty; 39 40 The memorial should be perpetual; and (3) 41 42 Private funds should be solicited and used for the 43 (4)44 memorial's construction; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Accounting 2 and General Services is requested to coordinate, and consider 3 constructing the memorial on the Diamond-Head side of the State 4 Capitol, and maintain the memorial; and 5

7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Accounting and General Services is requested to submit a report on its 8 plans, including findings, recommendations, projected costs, and 9 any implementing legislation, to the Legislature no later than 10 twenty days before the convening of the Regular Season of 2011; 11 and 12

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this Concurrent 14 15 Resolution be transmitted to the Hawaii Law Enforcement Memorial Foundation, the Governor, the Comptroller, the county police 16 chiefs, the Director of Public Safety, the United States Marshal 17 for the District of Hawaii, the Director of the State of Hawaii 18 Organization of Police Officers, and the President of the 19 20 Concerns of Police Survivors, Inc.
