SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO ASSIST PUBLIC SCHOOLS STATEWIDE IN ADOPTING AND IMPLEMENTING COMPREHENSIVE CAMPUS RECYCLING POLICIES.

1 WHEREAS, according to Edutopia and the George Lucas 2 Educational Foundation, many students and teachers across the nation are actively involved in Earth-friendly ventures, and for 3 4 many schools, the recycling program is first on the agenda; and 5 WHEREAS, in some places, however, recycling is still very 6 difficult to do, or even unheard of, and Edutopia is currently 7 conducting a poll on the status of recycling programs in 8 America's schools, including what can be done to increase their 9 10 size and scope; and 11 WHEREAS, according to the United States Environmental 12 13 Protection Agency, every ton of paper recycled would save enough energy to power the average American home for six months, save 14 seven thousand gallons of water, save 3.3 cubic yards of 15 16 landfill space, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions by one metric ton of carbon equivalent; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, recycling a single plastic bottle can conserve enough energy to light a sixty watt bulb for up to six hours, 20 and recycling one ton of plastic saves 7.4 cubic yards of 21 landfill space; and 22 23 WHEREAS, according to RecycleNow Schools, in a 2007 study 24 in England, on average, primary schools generated forty-five 25 kilograms (about ninety-nine pounds) of waste per pupil per 26 academic year, and secondary schools, twenty-two kilograms 27 (forty-nine pounds) per pupil per academic year, primarily food 28 29

29 and paper waste; and 30

31 WHEREAS, according to the United States Environmental32 Protection Agency, recycling reduces the amount of energy used



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to make materials and products, which in turn drastically 1 reduces the amount of carbon dioxide that is released into the 2 3 atmosphere; and 4 5 WHEREAS, according to Education World, schools that have implemented recycling programs have saved the school and school 6 district money, by avoiding unnecessary disposal costs; now, 7 therefore, 8 9 10 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the 11 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of 12 Education is requested to assist public schools statewide in 13 adopting and implementing comprehensive campus recycling 14 15 policies; and 16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Education is 17 requested to convene and provide administrative support for a 18 19 youth task force comprising high school students to propose 20 ideas and develop recommendations to be considered by the 21 Department in the establishment of campus recycling policies; 22 and 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Education 24 report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the 25 convening of the Regular Session of 2011 on the: 26 27 28 (1) Status of campus recycling policies statewide; 29 30 (2) Proposed additional or revised recycling options; 31 32 (3) Anticipated costs associated with the additional or revised options; 33 34 Anticipated savings or revenues generated through 35 (4) 36 campus recycling and provide a recommendation on how 37 the revenues generated through campus recycling are to be remitted to the Department of Education for deposit 38 to the credit of programs that fund K-12 education; 39 and 40 41 42 (5) Names and respective schools of the appointees to the 43 youth task force; and 44
