SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A TASK FORCE TO EXAMINE THE FEASIBILITY OF LOWERING THE AGE OF PHARMACY-ADMINISTERED VACCINATION RECIPIENTS TO NINE YEARS OLD.

WHEREAS, many children in our communities may not have ready access to vaccinations in public health emergencies, thereby making them more susceptible to disease; and

WHEREAS, pharmacies are located throughout our communities and often have more extensive hours of operation than physicians' offices so that our residents can easily gain access to them; and

WHEREAS, pharmacists who administer vaccinations must go through special training related to immunizations; and

WHEREAS, pharmacists who administer vaccines have adult and child cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training available; and

WHEREAS, eighteen states have enacted legislation that allows pharmacists to immunize patients as young as nine years of age, thereby providing families with young children more access to the benefits of immunization; and

WHEREAS, lowering the age restrictions for pharmacist-administered vaccinations will improve community access to potentially life-saving vaccines and will serve as a valuable preventative tool by allowing for quick and effective vaccination of a large number of people in the event of a public health emergency in Hawaii, such as the H1N1 flu outbreak; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Legislature

requests the Chair of the Board of Pharmacy to establish a task 1 force to conduct a study to determine the feasibility of lowering the age at which vaccinations may be administered by 3 4 pharmacists; and 5 6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force shall be named 7 the Pharmacist-Administered Vaccination Task Force (Task Force); and 8 9 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the purpose of the Task Force is to research and report to the Legislature on the following: 11 12 13 (1)The potential benefits and drawbacks of lowering the age restrictions for pharmacists to administer 14 vaccines to children; 15 16 (2) The most effective means to lower such age 17 18 restrictions; 19 Whether additional education or certification 20 (3) requirements for vaccinating pharmacists would be 21 necessary or recommended; and 22 23 Schemas of other states' vaccination age restrictions 24 (4)that allow vaccination of minors by pharmacists in all 25 or limited circumstances; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force be comprised of: 28 29 30 (1) The Director of Health or the Director's designee; 31 (2) At least one member of the Board of Pharmacy; 32 33 (3) At least one member of the Hawaii Pharmacists 34 Association; 35 36 37 (4)The Dean of the University of Hawaii at Hilo College 38 of Pharmacy or the Dean's designee; 39 40 (5) Two pharmacists from chain store pharmacies provided that one pharmacist shall be from a national chain 41 store with experience in pharmacy-administered 42 vaccinations to pediatric recipients as young as nine 43

years of age, and one pharmacist from each of two

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independent pharmacies; provided that the 1 2 participating pharmacies shall be selected by the task 3 force; and 4 (6) A member of the American Academy of Pediatrics, Hawaii 5 Chapter; and 7 8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Director of Health or the 9 Director's designee be the chairperson of the Task Force; and 10 11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the Task Force serve without compensation or reimbursement for expenses; and 12 13 14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force be situated in 15 the Department of Health for administrative purposes; and 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference Bureau is requested to assist the Task Force in drafting its 18 19 recommendations and any proposed legislation; and 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force is requested to 21 22 submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any implementing legislation, to the Legislature no later than 23 twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 24 2011; and 25 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force shall cease to exist after June 30, 2011; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 30 31 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Health, the Chair of the Board of Pharmacy, the Dean of the University 32

of Hawaii at Hilo College of Pharmacy, the District Manager for

Hawaii of Walgreens, the Local District Manager of CVS Caremark
