SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING A STUDY ON THE ECONOMIC AND ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS ON BUSINESSES AND COMMUNITIES AS A RESULT OF THE REDUCTION IN SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE'S PLANT QUARANTINE BRANCH AND COMMODITIES BRANCH STATEWIDE.

WHEREAS, in August and September 2009, a Senate Ad Hoc
 Committee conducted five informational briefings to gather
 information on the potential impacts of the anticipated
 reduction in services for the Department of Agriculture's Plant
 Quarantine Branch and Commodities Branch throughout the State;
 and

8 WHEREAS, nearly ninety per cent of Hawaii's consumer goods 9 are imported and ships alone bring in 500,000 sea containers 10 carrying 25,000,000 cartons - inspectors at harbors and airports 11 are the first line of defense in stopping invasive species; and 12

WHEREAS, in addition, the export value of agricultural products is in excess of \$160,000,000 and the scheduled layoffs will have a severe impact on Hawaii businesses due to the resulting reduction in exports; and

18 WHEREAS, California already imposes strict guidelines for 19 the importation of Hawaii's agricultural products and any 20 decline in meeting those requirements may result in an embargo 21 by California; and

23 WHEREAS, small businesses in particular are vulnerable, as 24 any additional difficulty in achieving nursery certifications 25 has a proportionately larger financial impact on smaller 26 operations; and

28 WHEREAS, the Plant Quarantine Branch's Biosecurity Program
29 is responsible for controlling the introduction and interisland
30 spread of invasive species in Hawaii; and



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WHEREAS, initially, the Plant Quarantine Branch listed 1 · seventy-two general funded positions and forty special funded 2 positions, with fifty-two of the general funded positions 3 scheduled for layoffs, and as a result of the briefings and 4 increased community attention, on September 24, 2009, the 5 Department of Agriculture announced temporary restoration of 6 twenty-two of the Plant Quarantine Inspector positions slated 7 for layoffs to support core inspection services at ports 8 statewide; and 9 10 WHEREAS, the \$1,800,000 funding for the twenty-two 11 positions includes \$600,000 earmarked for the Hawaii Invasive 12 Species Council and \$1,200,000 from fees collected in the pest 13 inspection, quarantine, and eradication fund, which comes from 14 maritime and airline companies that bring in cargo to Hawaii and 15 pay 50 cents per 1,000 pounds of cargo for inspection, 16 quarantine, and eradication of invasive species that may be 17 transported into the State; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the Department's Commodities Branch provides fee-20 for-service certification and auditing; enforces laws regarding 21 the guality and condition of agricultural products; issues 22 licenses for dealers in farm produce; conducts feed 23 registration, sampling, and enforcement for label guarantees; 24 and administers the milk control section; and 25 26 WHEREAS, the Branch is also responsible for seafood 27 inspections, seed certification, federal-state certification of 28 eggs, and food safety; and 29 30 WHEREAS, the Commodities Branch is projected to lose fifty 31 per cent of its full time staff, and on Hawaii island, the 32 layoffs will directly impact the papaya and coffee industries 33 and increase certification times from days to weeks; statewide, 34 over 1,800,000 pounds of papaya were checked and over 6,300,000 35 pounds of coffee certified in fiscal year 2009; and 36 37 WHEREAS, agriculture is a \$4,720,000,000 industry in Hawaii 38 and accounts for 38,000 jobs or five per cent of the statewide 39 total, and the proposed layoffs affect not only growers, but 40 have a substantial "trickle down" effect on other related 41 industries, such as packaging and fertilizer producers; and 42 43



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WHEREAS, larger agribusinesses may be able to pay for 1 private inspectors, small farmers will not be able to afford 2 this alternative; and 3 4 WHEREAS, aquaculture is one of the fastest growing industry 5 segments - valued at \$34,700,000 in 2008 - and cuts in inspector 6 services will impact both imports and exports; and 7 8 WHEREAS, seafood inspections account for nearly the same 9 volume as florals, and play a vital role in the stability of the 10 restaurant industry; and 11 12 WHEREAS, Hawaii's seed industry - valued at \$250,000,000 in 13 annual spending and currently the leading commodity in the 14 agricultural industry - faces a possible shutdown if inspectors 15 are not available to process research imports and exports; and 16 17 WHEREAS, invasive pests can cause millions of dollars in 18 crop losses, the extinction of native species, the destruction 19 of native forests, the spread of diseases, and the quarantine of 20 exported agricultural crops; and 21 22 WHEREAS, Plant Quarantine Inspectors must be able to 23 identify over 150 prohibited animals, 1,800 restricted animals, 24 1,800 conditionally approved fish, 600 general and nearly 22,000 25 species of grasses, as well as 100,000 hybrids of orchids that 26 require guarantine, and inspectors need a relevant academic 27 degree and three years of training, and currently, all branch 28 staff require overtime to meet inspection needs; and 29 30 WHEREAS, the projected cuts will reduce the staff by nearly 31 half, making adequate inspection impossible, and the loss of 32 these services will have a detrimental economic and 33 environmental ripple effect for businesses and communities 34 throughout the State; now, therefore, 35 36 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth 37 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the 38 House of Representatives concurring, that the Office of the 39 Auditor is requested to conduct a study on the economic and 40 environmental impacts on businesses and communities as a result 41 of the reduction of services for the Department of Agriculture's 42 Plant Quarantine Branch and Commodities Branch statewide; and 43 44



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to 1 analyze the environmental impacts, including: 2 3 The number and types of inspections, certification and (1)4 auditing, registration and enforcement, and other 5 services directly affected by the layoffs; 6 7 The adequacy of the workforce prior to the current 8 (2) reductions; 9 10 The shortage of entomologists on each island, and the (3) 11 impacts on timely responses; 12 13 (4)A review of the pest inspection, quarantine, and 14 eradication fund and compliance by cargo carriers that 15 are required to pay into the fund; 16 17 A review of the impact of using \$600,000 earmarked for 18 (5) the Hawaii invasive species council to fund inspector 19 services, particularly the consequences for "on the 20 ground" eradication and management programs of 21 invasive species; and 22 23 Other environmental impacts, particularly on 24 (6) communities and businesses that previously relied on 25 these services; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to 28 29 analyze the economic impacts, including: 30 The estimated annual dollar value of the loss to (1)31 businesses and other entities; 32 33 The estimated dollar value of the impact on other 34 (2) businesses and other providers of secondary goods and 35 services; 36 37 (3) Other economic impacts, such as higher unemployment 38 and reduced levels of services; 39 40 The impact on smaller areas, such as Kauai where the (4)41 Department is scheduled to lose the only office 42 person, leaving farmers without a point of contact in 43



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2 services and obtain information; 3 Layoffs of Aquaculture Branch staff, and the resulting 4 (5) 5 impacts on the industry; and 6 7 (6) Other financial impacts, particularly on communities and businesses that previously relied on these 8 9 services; and 10 11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to consult with, at minimum, the Department of Agriculture; the 12 Hawaii Invasive Species Council; the counties, and other 13 government and private sector agencies as deemed appropriate by 14 the Auditor, and legislators; and 15 16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor shall submit a 17 18 study of its findings to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2011; and 19 20 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the 22 Board of Agriculture, the Auditor, each county Mayor, and the 23 Hawaii Invasive Species Council Coordinator. 24 25 26
