SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE RENEGOTIATION OF LONG-TERM LEASES ON MOKAUEA ISLAND WITH PERSONS WHO RESIDE ON THE ISLAND AND AGREE TO PARTICIPATE IN AN EDUCATIONAL CENTER ON THE TRADITIONAL METHODS USED IN SELF-SUSTAINING HAWAIIAN FISHING VILLAGES.

WHEREAS, in Keehi Lagoon, between Honolulu Harbor and the
 Honolulu International Airport and less than half a mile from
 the bustling metropolis of downtown Honolulu, lies the small,
 ten-acre Mokauea Island; and

6 WHEREAS, maps dating as far back as 1817 show the fishing 7 village at Mokauea Island, the site of Oahu's last Hawaiian 8 fishing village and one of hundreds that thrived in pre-European 9 times, these villages were a repository of an impressive and 10 significant body of maritime skills including knowledge of the 11 sea, currents, tides, seasonalities, and the building and 12 handling of finely crafted canoes and fishing equipment; and 13

14 WHEREAS, Mokauea Island's fishing community was once 15 entirely self-sufficient due to a functional fishpond, 16 cultivation of vegetable and medicinal plants, as well as limu, 17 and a healthy supply of reef fish in the surrounding area; and 18

19 WHEREAS, in 1972, the State attempted to evict the 20 remaining seventeen families from Mokauea in order to build an 21 airport runway extension, and several fishers were arrested for 22 trespassing on land their families had lived on for generations; 23 and

WHEREAS, in June of 1975, in a final eviction attempt, the State burned down five fisher's homes, and these actions were recorded by local media and caused a public outcry; and 28

WHEREAS, the State negotiated a sixty-five year lease with
the islanders in 1978, agreeing to let them stay if they would
rebuild their houses according to the building code and



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establish an educational program for local students to learn 1 about traditional fishing and the reef environment; and 2 3 WHEREAS, the United States Navy provided labor and 4 machinery to construct a fishpond on the eastern side of the 5 Island and consultants from the University of Hawaii helped 6 Island residents stock it; and 7 8 WHEREAS, the fishers and their families rebuilt their 9 homes, and the Mokauea Fishermen's Association began their work 10 restoring and reviving the fishing village with the cooperation 11 of the United States Army and groups of students, teachers, 12 scholars, and scientists; and 13 14 WHEREAS, over the next thirty years, the fishpond faced 15 challenges ranging from invasive species to pollution and was 16 ultimately abandoned; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, similarly, the Mokauea Community's plans to rejuvenate the Island have faced many obstacles since that time, 20 the costs of rebuilding together with the high cost of living in 21 Honolulu generally have forced many families off the Island, and 22 by 2005, only a handful of families remained on the Island and 23 none possessed the financial or time resources needed to set up 24 25 an educational program or the needed facilities without assistance; and 26 27 WHEREAS, since 2005, Kai Makana, a not-for-profit, tax 28 exempt corporation, has been leading the effort to 29 environmentally and culturally restore Mokauea Island by 30 adopting the original vision of the Mokauea Fishermen's 31 Association, and its goal is to recreate a living example of a 32 traditional Hawaiian subsistence fishing village as a learning 33 center that will allow for scientific studies and the 34 perpetuation and practice of Hawaiian fishing and seafaring 35 36 culture; and 37 WHEREAS, projects planned or underway include the clearing 38 of invasive species, identification and reintroduction of 39 appropriate native plants, restoration of the fishpond, and 40 41 regular removal of marine debris; and 42 WHEREAS, infrastructure is also being planned, including 43 renewable energy systems, water production, wastewater and solid 44 2010-1444 SCR SMA.doc

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waste management, a community organic garden, telecommunications, and security, and these efforts are being supported by a diverse collection of community members, schools, private businesses, and government agencies, who share an interest in preserving Mokauea as a unique Hawaiian fishing village; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth 8 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the 9 House of Representatives concurring, that the Governor is urged 10 to designate the appropriate state agency to renegotiate long-11 term leases on Mokauea Island with persons who reside on the 12 Island and agree to participate with an educational center on 13 the traditional methods used in self-sustaining Hawaiian fishing 14 15 villages; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the designated state agency is 17 urged to renegotiate and enter into long-term leases for lands 18 comprising the entirety of what is commonly known as Mokauea 19 Island, Keehi Lagoon, Oahu, not to exceed sixty-five years in 20 duration, with persons who reside and have continuously resided 21 on Mokauea Island, or the lineal descendants of those who reside 22 and have continuously resided on Mokauea Island, since July 25, 23 1978, pursuant to a lease between the State and the Mokauea 24 Fishermen's Association, now known as the Mokauea Fishing 25 Village Association; and 26

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the lessees are urged to, in consideration of the leases granted by the State in cooperation with the state agency, agree to participate in, and become an essential part of, an educational center where students, teachers, and other members of the public can learn the traditional methods used in a self-sustaining Hawaiian fishing village; and

36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the state agency is requested 37 to establish a monitoring system and enforcement mechanism to 38 ensure compliance with these agreements; and

40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the designated state agency and 41 the lessees are requested to establish the Mokauea Island 42 Advisory Committee to:

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- Advise the state agency on matters related to the 1 (1) management of the leases, including eligibility 2 3 requirements for applicants for leases and the monitoring of lessee compliance with participation in 4 the interpretive programs; and 5 6 (2) Provide guidance to the lessees in fulfilling their 7 8 obligation to participate in the interpretive and caretaking programs on Mokauea Island; and 9 10 11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the designated state agency is 12 requested to include on the Mokauea Island Advisory Committee: 13 14 (1)One member representing the state agency, as designated by the director or chairperson of that 15 state agency; 16 17 Two members of the Mokauea Fishing Village 18 (2)19 Association, as designated by the Association; 20 One member representing Kai Makana, as designated by 21 (3) 22 the Governor; 23 (4)One member of the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation, 24 as designated by the Corporation; and 25 26 27 (5) One member of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, as designated by the Board; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 30 31 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian 32 Affairs, the President of the Mokauea Fishing Village 33 Association, the President of Kai Makana, and the Executive 34 35 Director of the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation. 36 37 38 OFFERED BY: Shzanne Chun aduland 2010-1444 SCR SMA.doc
