SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A TASK FORCE TO RECOMMEND A PROCESS TO CREATE A CITIZEN ROAD WATCH PROGRAM.

WHEREAS, according to the National Highway Safety 1 Administration in 2008, speeding-related fatalities in Hawaii 2 accounted for nearly half of all the traffic fatalities in 3 4 Hawaii; and 5 WHEREAS, in March, 2009, Honolulu police initiated a 6 sweeping crackdown on dangerous drivers in a campaign to reduce 7 the number of speeding-related accidents and fatalities; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, during the first weekend of the crackdown, Honolulu police issued six hundred and twenty-five speeding 11 12 citations, including seventeen for excessive speeding; and 13 WHEREAS, typically, the Honolulu police issue an average of 14 15 three thousand speeding citations each month; and 16 WHEREAS, in an effort to reduce speeding in residential 17 areas, a number of communities in other states have established 18 programs to engage local residents in changing driver behavior 19 20 on their neighborhood streets; and 21 WHEREAS, for instance, Neighborhood Speed Watch programs in 22 communities in Arizona, Florida, Maryland, Utah, Washington, and 23 Ontario, Canada train residents on how to use radar equipment 24 and collect speed data in their neighborhoods; and 25 26 WHEREAS, participating residents record the speed and 27

28 license plate information of speeding motor vehicles and send 29 this information to the owner of the vehicle, informing the 30 owner of the violation and encouraging the owner or driver of 31 the vehicle to drive at or below the posted speed limit; and 32



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1 WHEREAS, the Road Watch program in Richmond Hill in Ontario, Canada, gives residents an opportunity to report 2 aggressive and unsafe driving in their neighborhoods to the 3 police through the use of Citizen Report forms; and 4 5 .6 WHEREAS, this information assists the police in identifying 7 unsafe driving acts or "hot spots" that are traffic problem areas; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, a similar initiative in Hawaii could help deter speeding in local neighborhoods by raising public awareness of 11 the issue and educating drivers about the negative consequences 12 of speeding; now, therefore, 13 14 15 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth 16 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the 17 House of Representatives concurring, that the President of the 18 Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives are requested to convene a task force to recommend a process to 19 20 create a Citizen Road Watch program; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force be composed of: 23 24 (1)One member of the Senate appointed by the President of 25 the Senate; 26 27 (2) One member of the House of Representatives appointed 28 by the Speaker of the House; 29 (3) One representative of the Department of 30 31 Transportation; 32 33 (4) One representative of the Honolulu Department of Transportation Services; 34 35 (5) 36 The City and County of Honolulu Prosecuting Attorney 37 or the Prosecuting Attorney's designee; 38 (6) The Public Defender or the Public Defender's designee; 39 40 41 (7) One representative of the City and County of Honolulu Police Department; 42 43



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One representative of the Oahu Metropolitan Planning (8) Organization;

- (9) One representative of the Oahu Neighborhood Boards appointed by the President of the Senate; and
- (10)One representative of the Oahu Neighborhood Boards appointed by the Speaker of the House; and

10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the 11 Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 12 13 the Regular Session of 2011; and

15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the President of the 16 Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the 17 Director of Transportation, the Honolulu Prosecuting Attorney, 18 19 the State Public Defender, the Honolulu Police Chief, the Director of the Honolulu Department of Transportation Services, 20 21 and the Executive Director of the Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization. 22

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
