SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

ESTABLISHING A HAWAII STATE FALL PREVENTION TASK FORCE TO DEVELOP A STATEWIDE APPROACH TO REDUCING FALLS AMONG OLDER ADULTS.

WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that too many of our seniors 1 suffer devastating and many times deadly injuries due to falls; 2 and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, one third of our kupuna fall each year; and 6 7 WHEREAS, every five hours a senior is injured so severely 8 by a fall that the senior must be hospitalized, often never returning home; and 9

11 WHEREAS, in Hawaii, on average, emergency room, 12 hospitalization, rehabilitation and long-term care costs 13 directly related to senior falls total \$92 million dollars per 14 year, which equals \$252,000 per day; and

16 WHEREAS, the physical and emotional cost to our families is 17 incalculable; and

19 WHEREAS, falls are preventable and are not inevitable due 20 to aging; and

WHEREAS, balance screening, medication reviews, and vision examinations are just some of the programs that can help determine those seniors who are at risk of falling; and

26 WHEREAS, a variety of evidence-based best practice programs
27 can prevent falls, especially when incorporated with tai chi or
28 other exercise programs; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth
Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, the
House of Representatives concurring, that a Hawaii State Fall



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Prevention Task Force (Task Force) is established to develop a 1 statewide approach to reduce falls among older adults by 2 investigating and examining the immediate and long-term dangers 3 of fall injuries on our senior population, examining the fiscal 4 5 impact of senior falls on our medical system and health care costs, and recommending appropriate interventions and prevention 6 programs to reduce falls and health care costs associated with 7 8 falls; and 9

10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii State Fall Prevention Task Force consist of five members appointed by the 11 12 Governor, five members appointed by the President of the Senate, five members appointed by the Speaker of the House of 13 Representatives, and six additional members, who are leaders in 14 their industry or directors of their departments, or their 15 16 designees, and who shall collaborate with and support the work of the Task Force as requested. 17 These additional six members are to include: 18 19

(1) The Medical Director or Corporate Executive Officer of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation;

- (2) The Dean of Geriatric Medicine of the John A. Burns School of Medicine;
- (3) A representative of the Fall Prevention Consortium;
- (4) The Director of Health or the Director's designee;
 - (5) The Director of the Executive Office on Aging or the Director's designee; and
- (6) The Director of the Elderly Affairs Division of the City and County of Honolulu or the Director's designee; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, for administrative purposes, 37 38 the Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau is directed to designate a convener from among the membership of the Hawaii 39 State Fall Prevention Task Force; the Hawaii State Fall 40 Prevention Task Force shall be convened before August 15, 2010, 41 whether or not all membership appointments have been made at 42 43 that time; the Hawaii State Fall Prevention Task Force shall be convened at a place chosen by the designated convener; and the 44



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Legislative Reference Bureau shall provide administrative 1 support; and 2 3 **4** · BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, the Hawaii State Fall Prevention Task Force may fill any vacancies that may exist as 5 of August 15, 2010; and 6 7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that as part of its review, the 8 9 Hawaii State Fall Prevention Task Force is requested to: 10 (1) Investigate the most effective means to enhance public 11 awareness that falls are preventable; 12 13 (2) Review the potential for increasing the availability 14 15 and accessibility of fall prevention programs statewide for caregivers and the elderly on how to 16 prevent falls and effectively use community resources; 17 18 and 19 (3) Investigate the best way to expand the role of medical 20° and health care professionals in screening, educating, 21 and referring elderly to fall prevention programs; and 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii State Fall 24 Prevention Task Force is requested to collaborate with 25 26 interested stakeholders, including health care facilities, community coalitions, government agencies, and organizations 27 concerned with protecting our kupuna and preventing falls; and 28· 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that members of the Hawaii State 30 31 Fall Prevention Task Force have a background in elderly services, geriatric medicine, geriatric pharmacology, business, 32 insurance, health care, long-term care, hospital administration, 33 34 risk management, or public policy development, or be an advocate for or consumer of elderly care services; and 35 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that members of the Hawaii State Fall Prevention Task Force be appointed as soon as practicable, 38 39 but by no later than July 1, 2010; and 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii State Fall 41 Prevention Task Force submit an interim report to the 42 Legislature no later than twenty days before the convening of 43 44. the Regular Session of 2011, describing the progress made in the 2010-0427 SCR SMA-1.doc

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii State Fall
Prevention Task Force submit a final report, including any
proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty
days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2012; and

9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the 10 President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of 11 Representatives, the Medical Director of the Hawaii Health 12 13 Systems Corporation, the Dean of Geriatric Medicine of the John A. Burns School of Medicine, the Fall Prevention Consortium, the 14 Director of Health, the Director of the Executive Office on 15 16 Aging, and the Director of the Elderly Affairs Division of the 17 City and County of Honolulu. 18

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
