SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO ADOPT RULES TO ENFORCE THE BAN ON SHARK FEEDING FOR THE SAFETY OF THE PEOPLE OF HAWAII AND PRESERVATION OF ITS MARINE ECOSYSTEM.

1 WHEREAS, Hawaii's coastal waters are heavily used by 2 Hawaii's residents and visitors for numerous aquatic activities, 3 including fishing, boating, swimming, canoe paddling, kayaking, 4 jet skiing, parasailing, surfing, body surfing, snorkeling, and 5 scuba diving; and

7 WHEREAS, commercial shark viewing tours that attract sharks 8 into coastal waters through feeding and artificial means may 9 increase safety risks to humans participating in activities in 10 adjacent waters, promote interactions between fishermen and 11 sharks, and offend native Hawaiians and native Hawaiian 12 practitioners; and

14 WHEREAS, in 2002, the Legislature, citing concerns 15 regarding the impacts of shark feeding operations, enacted Act 16 127, Session Laws of Hawaii 2002, to prohibit the feeding of 17 sharks in state marine waters, which extend three nautical miles 18 from shore; and

20 WHEREAS, violations are petty misdemeanors with fines 21 ranging from \$100 to \$500; and

WHEREAS, in 2006, the federal Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act (MSA) was amended to prohibit introducing food into the water to attract sharks for any purpose other than to harvest sharks within the Exclusive Economic Zone seaward of the state, which is understood to be three to 200 nautical miles from shore; and

30 WHEREAS, there is public concern that commercial shark 31 viewing tours from Haleiwa Harbor routinely feed sharks for 32 their operations; and

WHEREAS, public concerns about commercial shark viewing 1 tours include alteration of the natural behavior and 2 distribution of sharks, which may increase risk to humans and 3 the sharks themselves, as well as impact shark populations and 4 the health of the marine ecosystem; and 5 6 WHEREAS, Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) 7 has expressed concerns over the enforceability and nominal 8 penalties of the statutory prohibition of shark feeding; and 9 10 WHEREAS, in view of such concerns, the Legislature believes 11 that shark viewing tour businesses, which rely on feeding or 12 response conditioning to attract sharks for commercial viewing 13 and human and shark interaction purposes, should be prohibited 14 from operating in state waters; now, therefore, 15 16 17 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, 18 that DLNR is urged to adopt rules to enforce the ban on shark 19 20 feeding; and 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that such rules should: 22 23 Prohibit commercial use of shark cages or other 24 (1) devices designed to place humans in close proximity to 25 sharks for the purpose of feeding them; 26 27 Prohibit use of public harbors and facilities, such as 28 (2) parks, piers, docks, and ramps, by shark tour 29 operators using such cages; 30 31 Prohibit the transportation of commercial shark (3) 32 feeding cages through state waters; and 33 34 Stringently enforce the law prohibiting the feeding of (4)35 sharks in the waters of Hawaii; 36 37 and 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that should DLNR decline to adopt 40 such rules, DLNR is urged to make specific recommendations to 41 the Legislature for the revision of the applicable state 42 statutes to promote enforcement of the prohibition against the 43

1 feeding of sharks and provide adequate deterrence from violation 2 of existing statutes; and
