SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A STATEWIDE SERVICE PROJECT TO PLANT ONE MILLION TREES AND CLEAN BEACHES ACROSS THE STATE BY OCTOBER 2010, AS PART OF THE CHILDREN AND YOUTH MONTH CELEBRATION.

1 WHEREAS, in October 2009, the Hawaii State Legislature's Keiki Caucus sponsored its 16th Annual Children and Youth Summit; 2 3 and 4 5 WHEREAS, two of its top priority issues identified by the children, youth, and adults who attended the summit are to plant 6 more trees and clean our beaches; and 7 8 WHEREAS, trees are essential to a healthy environment for 9 Hawaii, and increasing the number of trees planted in Hawaii 10 would improve Hawaii's natural beauty and provide other needed 11 12 benefits; and 13 WHEREAS, trees supply oxygen in the air we breathe and keep 14 the air supply fresh by absorbing carbon dioxide; and 15 16 WHEREAS, trees provide shade and shelter, reducing annual 17 heating and cooling costs in the United States by \$2.1 billion; 18 19 and 20 WHEREAS, tree roots stabilize the soil, prevent soil 21 erosion, support the capture and conservation of our water 22 supply, and help remediate pollutants; and 23 24 25 WHEREAS, trees cut down on noise pollution by acting as 26 sound barriers; and 27 WHEREAS, trees lower air temperatures by evaporating water 28 from their leaves; and 29 30 31 WHEREAS, in the 1980s, Hawaii successfully planted 1,200,000 trees for the "A Million Trees of Aloha" initiative; 32 and 33 34

1 WHEREAS, across the nation, in Los Angeles, Salt Lake City, 2 New York City, and other places, communities are working to plant a million trees in urban settings; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, Hawaii's beaches are famous for their crested turquoise waves crashing onto pristine, golden shores; and 6 7 WHEREAS, however, Hawaii is situated in the center of the 8 9 north Pacific sub-tropical gyre, which is several ocean currents that rotate around the islands; and 10 11 WHEREAS, this natural phenomenon results in Hawaii being a 12 13 natural magnet for thousands of tons of non-biodegradable 14 rubbish from all over the ocean; and 15 WHEREAS, synthetic rubbish from both sides of the Pacific, 16 17 southeast Asia and South America, is washed up on Hawaii's 18 beaches daily; and 19 20 WHEREAS, clearing marine debris from the ocean and beaches is important not just for restoring the natural beauty of 21 beaches, but also for saving marine life; and 22 23 24 WHEREAS, birds and animals mistake rubbish such as plastic 25 bags, cigarette lighters, and other brightly colored plastic as food and may suffer from internal injury, intestinal blockage, 26 27 and even starvation; and 28 29 WHEREAS, dolphins, whales, sea turtles, sharks, and seals get caught in fishing nets, lines, and other debris such as six-30 pack holders; and 31 32 33 WHEREAS, marine debris comes from land-based sources and water-based sources, and can last for years in the ocean before 34 35 disintegrating; and 36 WHEREAS, local efforts to clean up Hawaii's beaches include 37 the Beach Environmental Awareness Campaign Hawaii, which 38 39 distributes pocket ashtrays to avoid cigarette butts on beaches and teams with Aveda Lifestyle Salon & Spa at the Ala Moana 40 41 Center to recycle bottle caps; and 42 WHEREAS, these efforts demonstrate the community's strong 43 44 desire to clean up Hawaii's beaches, preserve their natural



1 beauty, and protect the ocean and land environment for future 2 generations; and

4 WHEREAS, statewide coordination of these efforts through a 5 centralized website provided by Kanu Hawaii can provide the 6 necessary support for community groups to clean every beach in 7 Hawaii and control the litter and marine debris problem; now, 8 therefore,

10 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, 11 that the Hawaii State Legislature's Keiki Caucus, Children and 12 13 Youth Month Planning Committee, and Kanu Hawaii, in partnership with other community organizations, are requested to establish 14 15 and coordinate a statewide service project to plant one million trees and clean beaches across the State by October 2010, as 16 part of the Children and Youth Month celebration; and 17 18

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the community groups are requested to partner with local growers to plant indigenous trees and fruit trees, when feasible, and log their efforts on the Kanu Hawaii website: kanuhawaii.org/milliontreesofaloha; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Keiki Caucus, with the 25 26 assistance of Kanu Hawaii, is requested to establish Malama o ke 27 Kahakai, a public service project for volunteers to care for 28 Hawaii's beaches by picking up litter and debris, and encourage community groups, churches, businesses, and individuals to pick 29 30 up litter and debris and beautify beaches across the islands, and log their efforts on the Kanu Hawaii website: 31 kanuhawaii.org/caringforourbeaches; and 32
