SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY AND THE HAWAII PAROLING AUTHORITY TO IDENTIFY UP TO FIVE HUNDRED NON-VIOLENT INMATES WHO COULD BE INVOLVED IN A DAY REPORTING CENTER, BE MONITORED VIA TWENTY-FOUR HOUR/SEVEN DAYS A WEEK GPS ELECTRONIC MONITORING, BE INCLUDED IN AN EXTENDED WORK FURLOUGH PROGRAM, AND/OR BE ELIGIBLE FOR AN EARLY RELEASE PROGRAM.

WHEREAS, Hawaii currently has over six thousand offenders
 incarcerated with about two thousand serving their prison
 sentences on the mainland; and

5 WHEREAS, many offenders are incarcerated due to technical
6 violations of their parole and not for committing another
7 felony; and

9 WHEREAS, many offenders are incarcerated due to
10 insufficient timely programming or lack of furlough bed spaces
11 to assist in their final transition; and

WHEREAS, many inmates are non-violent low risk offenders
who could be placed in community-based programming with proper
oversight; and

17 WHEREAS, twenty-four seven global positioning system (GPS) 18 electronic monitoring can also be utilized by the Department of 19 Public Safety to monitor offenders outside of prison facilities; 20 and

22 WHEREAS, day reporting centers have been successful in 23 jurisdictions across the nation, allowing offenders to report 24 back or check-in to public safety officials on a consistent 25 basis and be involved in programming; and

27 WHEREAS, consistent drug testing can also be a deterrent28 for offenders who are released from prison; and

30 WHEREAS, there are non-profit organizations and churches
31 that are willing to volunteer with and assist offenders who have
32 been released from prison; and

1 WHEREAS, the State currently spends approximately \$134 per 2 day to house an inmate in Hawaii and approximately \$74 a day to 3 house an inmate on the mainland; and 4 5 WHEREAS, tax dollars spent on the mainland to house inmates 6 would benefit Hawaii if those dollars can be redirected locally 7 in programs, staff, and facilities; and 8 9 WHEREAS, alternatives to incarceration in a prison or jail 10 are less expensive for taxpayers; and 11 12 WHEREAS, alternatives to incarceration can be more 13 beneficial for those offenders with children and families; now, 14 therefore, 15 16 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth 17 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, 18 that the Department of Public Safety and the Hawaii Paroling 19 Authority are requested to identify up to five hundred non-20 violent inmates by October 1, 2010 who could be involved in a 21 22 day reporting center and/or also be monitored through twentyfour hours/seven days a week GPS electronic means; and 23 24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Public Safety 25 is requested to develop a plan to add more offenders to the 26 Expanded Work Furlough Program; and 27 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Public Safety 29 is requested to look into establishing a day reporting center at 30 the Oahu Community Correctional Center and at Halawa 31 Correctional Facility by using existing space or erecting pre-32 33 fabricated modular buildings on site; and 34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Public Safety 35 implement in Hawaii, and look at, early release programs in 36 other jurisdictions that have successfully released offenders 37 into the community as stated in Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 38 125, S.D. 1, 2008, "Requesting The Department Of Public Safety 39 To Research And Study Early Parole Eligibility Programs That 40 Reduce The Minimum Period Of Time That Hawaii Inmates Must Wait 41 To Become Eligible For Parole"; and 42 43



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Public Safety 1 aggressively collaborate with churches, non-profit 2 organizations, and other entities that are willing to provide 3 free assistance and service to the State in these difficult 4 economic times; and 5 6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Public Safety 7 and the Hawaii Paroling Authority report to the Legislature on 8 the progress made in implementing this measure no later than 9 October 1, 2010, including the following information: 10 11 The number of paroles revoked for technical violations (1)12 and the nature of those violations; 13 14 The number inmates and parolees eligible for release; (2) 15 16 A plan to increase the number of individuals on the (3) 17 Expanded Work Furlough Program; 18 19 The feasibility of establishing a day reporting center (4) 20 at the Oahu Community Correctional Center and the 21 Halawa Correctional Facility; 22 23 Implementation of an early release and re-entry (5) 24 program for Hawaii inmates, and a description of 25 successful early release and re-entry programs in 26 other jurisdictions; and 27 28 A plan to expand connections with community churches (6) 29 and organizations to facilitate the reintegration of 30 formerly incarcerated individuals; and 31 32 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 33 Resolution shall be transmitted to the Governor, the Director of 34 Public Safety, and the Administrator of the Hawaii Paroling

35 Public Safe36 Authority.
