Madam:

Your Committee on Health, to which was referred S.R. No. 79 entitled:

"SENATE RESOLUTION URGING HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION HOSPITALS AND CLINICS TO ACCEPT MEDICAL STUDENT ROTATIONS FROM A.T. STILL UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE BASED OUT OF THE WAIANAE COAST COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH CENTER, THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII JOHN A. BURNS SCHOOL OF MEDICINE, AND OTHER HAWAII-BASED MEDICAL SCHOOLS,"

begs leave to report as follows:

The purpose of this measure is to urge the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation to accept medical student rotations from A.T. Still University School of Osteopathic Medicine based out of the Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center, the University of Hawaii John A. Burns School of Medicine, and other Hawaii-based medical schools at its facilities and to work with the Hawaii Primary Care Association to develop a plan to accomplish this objective.

Your Committee received testimony in support of this measure from nine individuals. Your Committee received testimony in opposition to this measure from the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation. Written testimony presented to the Committee may be reviewed on the Legislature's website.

Your Committee finds that there is a critical health care provider shortage in Hawaii that is particularly acute in rural areas. Your Committee further finds that doctors often enter

practice in the same locality in which they had their residencies and that encouraging teaching through medical student rotations at Hawaii Health Systems Corporation facilities may be one step toward easing the physician shortage.

Your Committee has amended this measure by requesting the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation to work with the Hawaii Primary Care Association to develop a plan to place students from the A.T. Still University School of Osteopathic Medicine based out of the Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center, the University of Hawaii John A. Burns School of Medicine, and other Hawaii-based medical schools in Hawaii Health Systems Corporation facilities for medical student rotations.

As affirmed by the record of votes of the members of your Committee on Health that is attached to this report, your Committee concurs with the intent and purpose of S.R. No. 79, as amended herein, and recommends its adoption in the form attached hereto as S.R. No. 79, S.D. 1.

SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION HOSPITALS AND CLINICS TO ACCEPT MEDICAL STUDENT ROTATIONS FROM A.T. STILL UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE BASED OUT OF THE WAIANAE COAST COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH CENTER, THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII JOHN A. BURNS SCHOOL OF MEDICINE, AND OTHER HAWAII-BASED MEDICAL SCHOOLS.

WHEREAS, a severe shortage of health care providers
 currently exists, particularly in the rural and medically
 underserved areas of the state; and

5 WHEREAS, aside from Oahu, most of the state is federally 6 designated as Medically Underserved Areas, Medically Underserved 7 Populations, or Health Professional Shortage Areas; and

9 WHEREAS, there is an urgent need to provide high quality
10 primary care services to already underserved populations with
11 disparate health indicators; and

13 WHEREAS, maternal and child health risk, cardiovascular 14 risk, and socio-economic risk are greatest in rural Hawaii; and 15

16 WHEREAS, according to the Department of Health's 1999 17 statistics, the top ten highest risk areas are all located in 18 rural communities; and

20 WHEREAS, the need for physicians in rural areas will only 21 increase with the aging population and projected population 22 growth on the neighbor islands; and

24 WHEREAS, national studies have demonstrated that
25 substantial residency training in rural areas increases
26 placement and retention of physicians in rural practices; and

1 WHEREAS, providing Hawaii's medical students with hospital 2 rotations in the state's rural areas is also of critical importance to promoting the development of "roots" in the 3 communities they may one day serve; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC) 6 comprises Hilo Medical Center, Hale Ho'ola Hamakua, and Ka'u 7 Hospital (East Hawaii Region); Kona Community Hospital and 8 Kohala Hospital (West Hawaii Region); Maui Memorial Medical 9 Center, Lanai Community Hospital, and Kula Hospital (Maui 10 Region); Leahi Hospital and Maluhia (Oahu Region); Kauai 11 Veterans Memorial Hospital and Samuel Mahelona Memorial Hospital 12 (Kauai Region); Yukio Okutsu State Veterans Home - Hilo; 13 Roselani Place - Maui; Ali'i Health Center - West Hawaii; and 14 affiliate HHSC facility Kahuku Medical Center - Oahu; and 15 16 17 WHEREAS, HHSC is heavily state subsidized to continue providing medical services throughout the state and in most 18 cases HHSC facilities are the only healthcare facilities in the 19 20 rural areas of the state; and 21 22 WHEREAS, HHSC's objective to provide health care services 23 to the people of Hawaii is in line with the goals of students in Hawaii-based medical schools; and 24 25 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds HHSC is obligated as a 26 27 state-funded hospital system to provide Hawaii-based medical students with the medical rotations they need in any of the HHSC 28 29 facilities; now, therefore, 30 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth 31 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, 32 that HHSC is urged to accept medical student rotations from A.T. 33 34 Still University School of Osteopathic Medicine based out of the Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center, the University of 35 36 Hawaii John A. Burns School of Medicine, and other Hawaii-based 37 medical schools; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the HHSC and the Hawaii Primary Care Association are requested to work together to develop a plan for placing students from the A.T. Still University School of Osteopathic Medicine based out of the Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center, the University of Hawaii John A. Burns School of Medicine, and other Hawaii-based medical schools in HHSC facilities for medical student rotations; and

9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 10 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Director of Health, 11 Chief Executive Officer of Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, 12 Dean of John A. Burns School of Medicine, Chief Executive 13 Officer of Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center, and the 14 Executive Director of the Hawaii Medical Association.
