SEVENTH DAY

Friday, January 29, 2010

The House of Representatives of the Twenty-Fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, convened at 12:05 o'clock p.m., with Vice Speaker Magaoay presiding.

The invocation was delivered in song by Representative Faye P. Hanohano, after which the Roll was called showing all Members present with the exception of Representative Herkes, who was excused.

SUPPLEMENTAL CALENDAR #1

Representative Say moved that action on H.B. No. 444, HD 1, SD 1, be postponed indefinitely, seconded by Representative Chong.

Representative Bertram rose to speak in opposition to the motion, stating:

"Yes, I don't support this motion mainly because I would love to see us vote this down and bring this whole issue back to our Caucuses, as well as to our Chamber so we can have a full discussion about this issue regardless of what the Governor may or may not do. I appreciate the intent of it, although I do disagree with it. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and action on H.B. No. 444, HD 1, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CIVIL UNIONS," was postponed indefinitely, with Representative Bertram voting no, and with Representative Herkes being excused.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Rhoads, for the Committee on Labor & Public Employment presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 7-10) recommending that H.B. No. 2103, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Legislative Management.

Representative B. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2103, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Legislative Management, seconded by Representative Evans.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I know it's unusual to speak on Second Reading, but this is an unusual bill. Thank you. This bill would effectively unionize the Legislature. I'm against the bill, Mr. Speaker. I speak in opposition. I would not like to see my office in rebellion against its leadership. I would not like to see this Body with its staff against this. And as a member of the Minority I would hate to see the tyranny of the Majority express itself again through unionization of our employees.

"So Mr. Speaker, I don't see what good can come of this. I think it leaves a lot to be desired, and I think it's probably the first exercise of the quote, "card-check bill" and we should do with this bill what we did with the previous one. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching rose in opposition to the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching's written remarks are as follows:

"In response to HB 2103, I submit these written comments:

"In these trying economic times, money is very tight. More than anything, I believe that we, as lawmakers, should 'look before we leap.' It is very simple: Unions create a middle man in the discussion between employee and employers. Unions are not free. By proposing another union,

we are proposing the creation of new costs to include supplemental infrastructure.

"Unions result in union dues, another unnecessary financial burden. I prefer my employees receive a higher salary without more taxes directed to union costs. I believe there are alternative ways to address the needs of employee-employer relations.

"For all of these reasons, I oppose HB 2103."

Representative Pine rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I actually support this measure, Mr. Speaker. I was against card-check for businesses, but I think since we are going to put the businesses in Hawaii through tremendous pain of having card-check in Hawaii, I think that we should have the same standards for ourselves. The Legislature, after all, our staff works longer hours than any other employee in the State of Hawaii. They have no breaks especially if you work in the Finance Committee, and very little time off. So I think we should treat our employees with much respect. They definitely deserve to unionize against us. Thank you."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Despite the Minority Floor Leader's comments, I will be voting no."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2103, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Legislative Management, with Representatives Ching, Finnegan, Marumoto, Thielen and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Belatti and Herkes being excused.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Evans, seconded by Representative Pine and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a certain House Bill for Third Reading by consent calendar. (Representatives Belatti and Herkes were excused.)

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 2162, HD 1:

On motion by Representative B. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, H.B. No. 2162, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Belatti and Herkes being excused.
