UNFINISHED BUSINESS

H.B. No. 2003, HD 3:

Representative B. Oshiro moved that H.B. No. 2003, HD 3, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Evans.

Representative C. Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just very briefly, I rise in support. This bill has been a long time in the making. The Campaign Spending Commission has worked tirelessly for years to recodify our outdated and piecemeal campaign finance laws. H.B. 2003, HD 3 is the culmination of all this effort.

"It streamlines our campaign finance laws into simple and straightforward language. It upholds Hawaii's high standard of transparency and accountability, preventing even the appearance of impropriety by prohibiting political contributions from State contractors. And it addresses the broad impact of unrestricted and unregulated corporate contributions.

"We've tried to incorporate in this draft the exact language and intent of the Hawaii State Campaign Spending Commission. Nothing more, and nothing less. However, there's still more work ahead. In addition to this language, much of which the Commission introduced in their first draft of the bill, changes have been made throughout the legislative process that they have adopted as their own. We must be sure that all the final and necessary changes and tweaks requested by the Commission are incorporated into a final draft before becoming law. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support, and may I insert written comments."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"I rise in strong support of HB 2003, HD 3. The recodification of the campaign finance law is long overdue without tinkering by the Legislature. As noted in the testimony of the Campaign Spending Commission, this bill is the work-product of the Commission's Blue Ribbon Recodification Committee that completed its work in 2008 after meeting regularly for nine months. The Committee was comprised of the Commission's staff and seventeen volunteer attorneys experienced in campaign finance laws and representing diverse interests. This bill reorganizes previously unorganized, difficult to read, and inconsistent provisions in the current

law that has been amended in piecemeal fashion since the campaign finance law was originally promulgated in 1973.

"Undoubtedly, there are other areas that different advocates and legislators may want to change. Because these changes ultimately involve specific policy questions beyond the realm of the Recodification Committee, the Legislature should make these changes in different bills and allow the work of the Recodification Committee to move forward in this bill. For these reasons, I support HB 2003, HD 3."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2003, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN FINANCING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Bertram, Har, Pine and Thielen being excused.

Representative McKelvey, for the Committee on Economic Revitalization, Business, & Military Affairs presented two reports:

Representative B. Oshiro moved that the reports of the Committee be adopted, and that H.R. No. 41, and H.C.R. No. 92, be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Evans.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of both measures with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support with mild reservations. Mr. Speaker, I was very moved by the comments of the Majority Leader's staff as one of the newest Americans and coming from Serbia, in talking about how great America is, how great our freedoms are. I am being reminded that this measure says that the government has to teach people how to pour alcoholic drinks. The government has to show how drunkenness occurs.

"I'm not sure why the land of the free and the home of the brave has to take over the private sector. We know that on a national level, this is getting increasingly, a creeping phenomenon, that the strong, the independent people, that the young lady from Serbia, now an American, just reminded us of who we are. I think, Mr. Speaker, we have to return to a little bit more independence and not the 'nanny state' that we tend to be nudging ourselves towards. This is a nice measure that's warm and fuzzy, but do we have to do that? That's the question. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker, I rise in support. I'd like to address the reason why we should move forward with this measure. On the Big Island, Mr. Speaker, only just about a week and a half ago we had a young high school girl killed, from Kealakehe High School. The students are so upset that they asked Representatives to join them this Saturday in sign waving to ask people to stop drinking and driving.

"The problem on the Big Island continues. We see it all the time, people getting killed from drunken driving. As a matter of fact a task force was created many years ago and people meet every year to talk about how we're going to stop the accidents that happens on our roads. From that task force they've created several ideas on what to address.

"One of those ideas is server training. In researching these resolutions, what we found is that liquor commissions on each island, several of them

are trying to address this idea of server training. There are some pilot projects. There are examples of how they're looking at doing server training. One of the things that came up is, because this is such an important issue, it probably should elevate itself to server training being equal on all islands. So that when people that work in bars and restaurants and waitresses, as they move around the islands, they actually will qualify, they're certified and have reached a certain level of training.

"I think it's worthy of us looking at it as a statewide program. I think it will help the liquor commissions. It will help our workers that want to move around the islands. And more importantly, this is being recommended by the community as a possibility, and that's what this study is about. It's the feasibility of doing this. It's a possibility because we've got to stop this. Too many people are dying on our roads. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Finnegan rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."
