

In consideration of **GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE 282** SUBMITTING FOR CONSIDERATION AND CONFIRMATION TO THE HAWAII HISTORIC PLACES REVIEW BOARD, GUBERNATORIAL NOMINEE, NAOMI **CLARKE LOSCH, FOR A TERM TO EXPIRE 6-30-2014**

The Department of Land and Natural Resources strongly supports the gubernatorial appointment of Ms. Naomi Clarke Losch to the Hawaii Historic Places Review Board for a term to expire 6-30-2014.

The Hawaii Historic Places Review Board was established under Section 6E-5.5, Hawaii Revised Statues, to: (1) Order and enter historic properties into the Hawaii Register of Historic Places on the basis of their value to Hawaii's heritage; (2) Evaluate and, when appropriate, recommend the nomination of historic properties to the National Register of Historic places; (3) Review the State Survey of Historic Properties; (4) Review the content of the State Historic Preservation Plan; and (5) Maintain the Hawaii Register of Historic Places (including all those listed on the National Register of Historic Places).

State law requires that the Hawaii Historic Places Review Board include at least one professionally qualified member of each of the following disciplines: archaeology, architecture, history, and sociology. In addition, there shall be one person knowledgeable in traditional Hawaiian society and culture.

Ms. Losch has spent her life in the Islands. She attended the Kamehameha School for Girls, graduating in June of 1963. Subsequently, she earned a Bachelor of Arts in Anthropology and a Master of Arts in Pacific Island Studies from the University of Hawaii at Manoa. She was then
