CONCERNS RE HB 1106 RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT

Dear Chairperson Rhoads, my name is Deborah Ward and I live in your district and I placed my trust when I voted for you. I work for the Department of Land and Natural Resources and I am a member of HGEA.

I would to share with Committee on Labor and Public Employees members my concerns on HB 1106, RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT.

The bill has the "appearance" of supporting public employees by calling for protection of the rights of public employees by preserving health, retirement, leave, and other benefits if furloughs are implemented in fiscal years 2009 to 2013.

And, unlike HB 1725, this bill does not appear to decrease the employer's contribution to the Hawaii employer-union health benefits trust fund; but would you change this later on?

My objection to the idea of possible furloughs is this: I'm also a taxpayer. I spend money at local businesses every day to buy food, clothing and other needs.

I don't believe it's fair for the House to be looking at ways to balance the budget on the backs of public employees. I work hard at my job and things are even harder now since vacancies have been frozen and demands for services have increased. I've made a career in public service knowing that my pay may not be as good as in the private sector but I could rely on retirement and health benefits for myself and my family.

I think it's wrong for representatives to take these benefits away from me.

Please look for other ways to balance the budget! Raising the excise tax would be a fairer way to address the state's revenue problem. Everyone paying a little more will mean sharing the burden during these tough times.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony this morning. My name is Judy Kodama. As an RN (public employee) working for Maui Memorial Medical Center for 22 years, I am very upset by the introduction of the HB 1106, introduced by Speaker Calvin Say.

I currently manage a very busy inpatient dialysis unit at Maui Memorial Medical Center. Many of my staff works 16 hours and sometimes work 10 -13 days stretch in order to meet the demands of our very sick kidney diseased patients on Maui. Many times, nurses work additional hours because there is no one experienced to do the job; certain specialized nurses are not readily available and if benefits are cut, many of the staff will definitely leave the island. What would happen to our patients if we were not here to take care of them? Who is going to take care of the patients if we are given furlough? This bill is very disrespectful to the not only the dialysis nurses but to our nursing profession. I also would like to add that nurses need other public employees to assist in caring for these patients. These people may be purchasing clerks, CSR staff, housekeepers, and kitchen workers...all public employees. We cannot do our job if these people are not here to help.

Please reconsider to vote "no" to HB 1106 that potentially put our community in danger. Thank you, again for allowing me to voice my concerns on this House Bill.
