I. OVERVIEW OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

H.B. 1287 proposes to place restrictions on the creation of civil service exempt positions and requires an annual review of exempt positions to determine whether they should be converted to civil service positions.

H.B. 1287

RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT

Chair Rhoads and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify on H.B. 1287.

The Department Accounting and General Services opposes this bill.

H.B. 1287 would repeal exempt positions every three years. This would hamper the State in its determination of the best way to fill and maintain services for the public. It would also limit the State's ability to effectively utilize exempt positions to fulfill job requirements that cannot be fulfilled by civil service positions.

Exempt positions give the State flexibility in job classification, pay, and recruitment that are necessary for non-traditional projects or programs. The proposed elimination of exempt positions will hinder agencies' ability to implement these projects and programs, and the public services they provide.
