## TESTIMONY BEFORE THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION ON HB 1303 RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLES

Thank you Chair Souki and committee members. I am Gareth Sakakida, Managing Director of the Hawaii Transportation Association (HTA) with 380 transportation related members throughout the state of Hawaii.

Hawaii Transportation Association has concerns about this bill. As a principal, it is worrisome whenever a safety device is eliminated or disengaged. This one is especially so because it involves the act of reversing a vehicle - the most dangerous maneuver a large vehicle can undertake.

The danger is exacerbated because the safety device is disengaged during a period when it is dark and there are people in the are having a good time (i.e. inebriated and/or socializing) and not paying attention - at least in Waikiki.

A measure of safety is attempted by the use of rearview cameras. However, many motor carriers in Hawaii have drifted away from their use because drivers began to rely on them too much and forgot about critical procedures for reversing. Camera angles were also found to be too limited.

Flashing lights can be effective. However, they are no help to blind persons, and are no help if the lights blind a sighted person.

It has been accepted in the construction industry that a warning system is not necessary when a guide is assisting the driver. However, the guiding is done by personnel familiar with the type of vehicles, and this movement takes place in a controlled area populated by people who are also knowledgeable of the situation.

A guide who is unfamiliar with, or is unaware of, the limitations of large vehicles can miss critical directional needs. A guide may miss detecting pedestrians or obstructions because of the darkness and/or limited line of sight because of the vehicle's size.

This guide's role is extremely critical and liability should be assume for damage, injury, or fatality that occurs while guiding the vehicle. We suggest an amendment to page 3, line 10 to read, "... vehicle's driver. The guide shall be liable for any damages, injuries, and/or fatalities that occur while guiding the vehicle.
