in consideration of HB 1603 HD 1 RELATING TO HAWAII'S ECONOMY

Chair Tokioka, Vice Chair Oshiro, and members of the House Committee on Legislative Management.

HB 1603 HD 1 directs the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) to contract for a study of Hawaii's economy by an out-of-state contractor. The Department supports the intent of this measure as long as its implementation does not impact or replace the priorities set forth in the Executive Biennium Budget for Fiscal Years 2009-2010

The study would be composed of two parts: 1) a diagnostic assessment of the state's economic condition and 2) development of an overall strategy for addressing the state's economic development challenges. We would like to point out that much of the requested content of such a study has been developed to some degree in recent and current efforts. For instance, a project several years ago sponsored by the National Governor's Association called "Pathways to Advancement," assessed the overall strengths and weaknesses of Hawaii's economy and economic development resources and made a number of recommendations. Other projects have also addressed elements of the proposed study including the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (or CEDS) project conducted by the State Office of Planning and county development boards, Hawaii's applications for the U.S. Department of Labor's Workforce Initiatives for Economic Development (or WIRED) grants, the Clean Energy Initiative, the recent profile of the high technology industry by the Hawaii Science and

Technology Council (HiSciTech) and recent reports on innovation and emerging industries by DBEDT's Research and Economic Analysis Division.

Current efforts that will develop additional information and recommendations related to such a study include preparation of a technology development plan, led by the High Technology Development Corporation, University of Hawaii and private sector interests. Also underway is a new State-County update of the CEDS plan. In addition, continued research is being conducted on emerging growth industries by the DBEDT Research Division.
