Re: HB1718 RELATING TO EMPLOYER-UNION HEALTH BENEFITS.

Specifies that the requirement that the State and the counties reimburse retired employees for medicare part B premiums through the employer-union trust fund applies only to the employees who retire prior to 12/31/09.

I am opposed to this bill because of its unfairness to all employees involved and it will not help the economic status of the state at all.

What this bill will encourage is to increase the number of people who do qualify to retire to do so before your deadline of July 1, 2009 in order to qualify for the CURRENT benefits you are paying so that this bill will not AFFECT their economic status. This means that people who have already been working in the "SYSTEM" for the state way past what is consider to be retirement age because it was possible to accumulate a decent retirement package will ENSURE their coverage but not be extended to others.

What is the purpose of this bill? Is this to ensure that you will always have people in the work force? Is it to bring in additional money to the state coffers? What is the fallout of this proposal? Testimony Against HB 1718

The current legislation being discussed on Friday, February 13 regarding retiree health benefits may save the state some money, but at the cost of a two tiered health benefit system for public employees. I am a younger member of UHPA and part of the reason working for the state was so attractive was the retiree health benefits. Take that incentive away and you take away a large financial reason for being a public employee. Many senior faculty at our school may retire as a result of this legislation (if it passes) and this could lead to chronic shortages among our faculty just when enrollment is increasing.
