Bill No. and Title: House Bill No. 1788, Relating to Family Court

Purpose: Mandates that the family court provide relevant information to any statewide victim information and notification program, operated by the department of public safety, relating to juvenile law violators who would have been charged with certain offenses.

Judiciary's Position:

While the Judiciary takes no position on the intent of House Bill No. 1788, we respectfully request clarification regarding the following:

- 1. Is the information requested relating only to those juveniles over whom Family Court jurisdiction was waived and who therefore are subject to prosecution in the adult criminal justice system and under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Safety?
- 2. If not, then will the Department of Public Safety maintain a confidential version of this statewide victim information and notification program applicable to those juveniles under Family Court jurisdiction pursuant to HRS Chapter 571?

Representative Mizuno, Representative Brower, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Public Safety (PSD) sincerely appreciates the legislature's interest in an automated victim notification system for Hawaii. PSD is already far along in our efforts to develop and implement an automated statewide victim notification system known as the "Statewide Automated Victim Information and Notification" (SAVIN) program, which is powered by Appriss' Victim Information and Notification Everyday (VINE) system. We have already developed and are currently implementing a statewide automated notification system for Hawaii that is scheduled to go on line February 28, 2009. This effort is currently being funded using a grant from the United States Depart-ment of Justice (DOJ) in the amount of \$706,664.00. In addition, the PSD also received two federal Victim of Crime Act (VOCA) grants, totaling \$390,000, to start up the program.

To better assist us in our efforts and ensure that the system is victim-centered and victim-sensitive, PSD established a Governance Committee comprised of victims of crime, directors from the victim/witness assistance units from each County's Prosecutor's Office, victim advocacy groups, the Hawaii Paroling Authority (HPA) Administrator, the Crime Victims Compensation Commission (CVCC) Executive Director, and representatives from the Attorney General's Office.

Hawaii SAVIN will allow for "open" enrollment for anyone who wishes to be notified of changes in an offender's custody and parole status. Victims of crime will have the ability to register for this service with the various Victim/Witness Assistance Units within each County's Office of the Prosecuting Attorney or they and others can simply go online to register at http://www.vinelink.com. Operators will also be available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year at 1-877-VINE-4HI (1-877-846-3444) in order to address basic questions callers may have. The English language system is scheduled to go live on February 28, 2009, and we are targeting March 31, 2009 as the go live date for the Japanese language system. In the near future, we have plans to add the Korean language followed by the llocano dialect of the Filipino language. In addition, we are currently working on the possibility of adding in a Hawaiian language script as well.

It is important to note that the current SAVIN system PSD is developing will focus on adult offenders and parolees, as well as juveniles who are tried as adults. Given privacy issues, juveniles adjudicated in family court are not included in the current notification system. In order to implement a more comprehensive automated notification system. PSD welcomes additional cooperation from the Judiciary with respect to court calendar events, including immediate releases from courthouses statewide. The SAVIN system has the ability to receive court event information every 7 minutes and provide appropriate notifications to victims and those that register literally as the events at the court are occurring.

PSD currently has enough funding to complete implementation and further develop Hawaii SAVIN through December 2010. Therefore, it is PSD's intent to seek permanent funding for this program from the 2010 Legislative Session. I welcome the opportunity to provide this committee with a detailed informational briefing regarding Hawaii SAVIN as your schedule permits. I also welcome the opportunity to work with your staff on amending HB 1788 to address those areas that are not currently included in our development and implementation plan.
