TESTIMONY ON HOUSE BILL NO. 2056, H. D. 1, RELATING TO PHARMACIST LICENSURE.

TO THE HONORABLE DAVID Y. IGE, CHAIR, TO THE HONORABLE JILL N. TOKUDA, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEES:

My name is Dr. Elwin Goo, Chair of the Board of Pharmacy ("Board") and I appreciate the opportunity to present testimony on behalf of the Board. The Board supports this bill with amendments to Section 3. This bill would allow the Board to recognize practical pharmacy experience for a pharmacist license, to include experience obtained in territories of the U.S. and the District of Columbia, or at designated advanced practice locations under the supervision of a registered or licensed pharmacist.

At its February 18, 2010 meeting, the Board considered both this bill and the companion bill, Senate Bill No. 2390, S.D. 2, which was heard by the Senate Committees on Health and Higher Education. The Committees clarified the language requiring that the supervising pharmacist supervising the practical experience be duly registered or licensed in the state, territory or district where Testimony on House Bill No. 2056, H.D. 1 Wednesday, March 10, 2010 Page 2

the experience is obtained. The Board prefers the language in the companion bill, Senate Bill No. 2390, S.D. 2 as it more clearly clarifies the registration or license status of the supervising pharmacist.

Consequently, we respectfully request that the committee amend this bill for clarification as follows:

In Section 3 of the bill, Section 461-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

- (1) Is at least eighteen years of age;
- Holds a degree from a school or college of pharmacy or department in a university which is recognized and accredited by the American Council of Pharmaceutical Education;
- (3) Has a minimum of fifteen hundred hours practical experience in any state <u>or territory</u> of the United States [in a pharmacy], or the District <u>of Columbia</u>, under the supervision of a [registered] pharmacist [in <u>that domicile</u>.]w ho is duly registered or licensed in the state, <u>territory, or district where the experience is obtained</u>. Service and experience [in a pharmacy] under the supervision of a registered pharmacist as required in this section shall be predominantly related to the [selling of drugs, compounding prescriptions, preparing pharmaceutical preparations, and keeping records and making reports required under state and federal

> statutes.] practice of pharmacy as defined under section 461-1. In the event an applicant has no practical experience as required, the applicant may take the examination and upon passing the examination, shall not receive a license until after the [fulfillment of] applicant fulfills the practical experience requirement;

- (4) Has passed an examination as may be prescribed by the board; and
- (5) Does not have an encumbered license or a pending disciplinary action or unresolved complaint in the practice of pharmacy in any state or territory of the United States, <u>or the District of Columbia</u>, or if any license has been or is encumbered, the applicant shall provide all information requested by the board."

We believe that these amendments would effectuate the intent of this bill by allowing a pharmacist who is appropriately licensed in other locations to supervise pharmacy students obtaining the practical experience towards a Hawaii pharmacist license.

HB 2056 HD 1 RELATING TO PHARMACIST LICENSURE

Chairs Ige and Tokuda, Vice Chairs Green and Sakamoto and Members of the Committees:

On behalf of the University of Hawai`i at Hilo (UHH) College of Pharmacy, thank you for the opportunity to support HB 2056 HD 1with amendments. The education of future pharmacists and community leaders who will improve healthcare in Hawai`i and throughout the Pacific Basin is a key mission of the College of Pharmacy. Beginning in May 2010, passage of this bill will enable fourth year student pharmacists who perform advanced pharmacy practice experience rotations in a United States territory or the District of Columbia to have those hours of practical experience count toward meeting the 1500 hours required for licensure as a pharmacist.

The UHH College of Pharmacy prefers the language in SB 2390 SD2, passed by your Committees last month and respectfully requests adoption of that version. These technical changes improve the clarity and accuracy of the bill with no substantive affect.

Passage of HB 2056 HD 1 with the recommended amendments will encourage student pharmacists from the United States territories in the Pacific Basin such as American Samoa, Guam and the Northern Marianas Islands to enroll at UHH and the College of Pharmacy. This measure will provide opportunities for students to return for advanced pharmacy practice experience rotations and improve the level of healthcare in their home territories. Finally, this will expand the number of diverse practical experience rotations that the College of Pharmacy can offer to all its 85–90 fourth year student pharmacists.
