The Insurance Division does not have the experience or expertise on case management practices such as to provide any assistance to the Task Force. Therefore, the Department respectfully requests that the Commissioner be deleted as a member of the Task Force.

<u>PURPOSE:</u> The purpose of this bill is to establish a Health Care Case

Management Task Force in the Department of Human Services to research the

quality of care provided by case managers and case management agencies and to

ensure that standards of practice are consistently followed.

<u>DEPARTMENT'S POSITION</u>: The Department of Human Services (DHS) respectfully opposes this bill.

The Department of Human Services is not in a position to divert our reduced staff or resources for the new duties of this proposed task force. Now, more than ever, we must focus our energy and efforts on core functions.

AN EQUAL OPPORTUNITY AGENCY

There is no funding provided to facilitate or convene the task force. Given the State's current fiscal difficulties and the \$1.23 billion budget shortfall for this biennium, we cannot support using resources to administer this task force.

Finally, given the scope of the programs to be reviewed and the composition of the task force, the placement of the task force in DHS is not appropriate.

HB 1886 RELATING TO CASE MANAGERS.

Catholic Charities Hawai'i (CCH) is a private, 501(c)(3) organization that has provided social services for people in need in the State of Hawaii since 1947. CCH supports HB 2154, with recommendations.

CCH is a licensed case management agency on the island of Hawai'i, providing case management for community care foster family home residents since 1997. In addition, CCH provides case management for elders living independently, children in the child welfare system and other special needs populations.

CCH recognizes that case management has many forms. The term is sometimes used interchangeably with terms such as "social work", "discharge planning", "counseling", "information & referral", "service coordination" and more. CCH supports the development of a task force to review the diverse forms of case management and to begin working toward standards of practice and common definitions of case management functions.

RECOMMENDATION: CCH recommends that the number of task force members be increased to include a representative of a licensed case management agency providing services as described in HRS 346-333. This particular type of case management is highly regulated and includes delegation of nursing functions that is not common in most other models of case management. A possible representative of a licensed case management agency could be the President or designee of the Case Management Council, whose members are comprised of licensed case management agencies.
