Title of Bill:

HB 2267 RELATING TO PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOLS.

Purpose of Bill:

Requires the Department of Education to provide an early and equitable distribution of grant moneys received to the Hawaii Charter School Administrative Office when charter school enrollment numbers were used to secure federal grants.

Department's Position:

The Department of Education supports this bill to ensure the charter schools receive their "fair share" of federal funds as quickly as possible, with the following concern. The bill is based on an assumption that all federal funds have some sort of instructions regarding distribution, and that the funds give the State Education Agency and Local Education Agency a great deal of discretion regarding the use of the funds. In actuality, that may not be the case. In addition, when public charter schools receive federal funds, they will need to be accountable to meet all of the federal requirements of the program and provide the Department with accurate data required for timely reporting within the stated deadlines.

Written testimony in support of H.B. No. 2267

Chair Oshiro, Vice Chair Lee, and Members of the Committee,

Aloha,

I am Maunalei Love, executive director of the Hawaii Charter School Administrative Office (CSAO). I want to thank the chair and the entire committee for the time and effort being spent to remedy the issue of adequately providing needed resources to all public schools. The CSAO supports providing Hawaii's charter schools with access to available federal funds for our students, giving them the educational opportunities that will enable them to succeed.

We support the intent and language of HB2267, requiring the Department of Education (DOE) to equitably distribute federal funds in a timely manner for any funds that the DOE receives to which charters are eligible. Historically, federal funding is received by the DOE based on the total enrollment of students, including the charter school students, but this funding is not always distributed equitably to charter school students. While this has been improving over the years, this bill will serve to expedite the proper equitable and timely distribution of these funds within the public education system in Hawaii.

We support this bill for the changes it makes towards providing a supportive environment for all DOE and public charter schools to better position Hawaii in competition for U.S. Department of Education's Race to the Top (RTT) initiative. States with policies in place supporting equitable funding for all public school students are at greater competitive advantage to qualify for RTT and other federal grant programs. The CSAO agrees that as a part of the assurances of RTT, accountability and transparency are an important component of educational outcomes, and that this is also tied to equitable funding and overall support from the state and federal government.

The CSAO is ready, willing, and able to help with any revisions. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.

My name is Taffi Wise and I am the executive director of the Kanu o ka `Aina Learning `Ohana (KALO), which supports thousands of lifelong learners from multiple communities throughout Hawaii.

KALO is encouraged by this proposal and in **support of the intent that HB2267** brings; we stand behind the position that federal monies allocated to the Department of Education should move with the child if they choose to attend a Public Charter School.

We believe this is the beginning of needed language within the Hawaii State law that supports the Federal position for facilitating and managing Federal funds. Aloha Chair Oshiro, Vice Chair Lee and Committee Members:

On behalf of the Hawaii Technology Academy, a public charter school which serves students in Oahu, Kauai, Hawaii Island and parts of Maui, thank you for the opportunity to offer testimony.

This bill would ensure that the distribution of funds received goes to the charter schools in an equitable distribution when charter enrollment numbers are included to secure additional funds. Already federal regulations are in place requiring states that receive Title I funds to distribute those funds within 45 days of receipt, this includes public charter schools. We would like to see this policy executed to provide fair funding for all public schools, including charter schools.

Since the first public charter schools were established, we have seen a rapid growth and strong demand for the individualized education a public charter school can provide. But public charter schools continue to struggle to establish funding parity with traditional public schools.

HTA is one of Hawaii's 31 public charter schools that are part of the state public school system. Like Hawaii Department of Education (DOE) schools, charter schools comply with federal and state educational standards and rely on the same funding sources. That is why we support this bill which bridges the gap to provide more equity in the distribution of funding for all public charter school students.

Most of all, we endorse changes that create equitable funding and a supportive environment for all DOE and public charter schools to better position Hawaii in competition for U.S. Department of Education's Race to the Top (RTT) initiative. States with policies in place supporting equitable funding for all public school students are at greater competitive advantage to qualify for RTT and other federal grant programs.

For these reasons, we respectfully urge members to support the passage of this bill.

Comments:

I am in strong support of this bill. As with EDN 150 funds, all Federal funds are not included in our funding formula (which hasn't even been used for two years). We have been especially concerned with " formula" grants to the State whereby all public school students are included in the count. In EDN 100 there is \$96.7M, EDN 150 has \$63.2M, Edn 200 has \$.3M, and EDN 400 has \$24.3M in formula grants for a total of \$184.6M in formula grants. Charter school students should have access to these funds. As Interim Superintendent atayodhi states: " When public charter schools receive federal funds, they will need to meet all of the federal requirements of the program and provide the department with accurate data required for timely reporting within the stated deadlines. " Charter Schools would like the opportunity to prove that they can meet the requirements given the chance to participate in these grants. Charter schools have met the conditions of the larger formula grants such as Title I and IDEA and can and should meet the requirements of the other formula grants.
