## In consideration of HOUSE BILL 241 RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

House Bill 241 proposes to allow the Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs) to retain all contributions, moneys, and funds received, in lieu of the requirement that such funds, including unexpended general funds, be deposited to the State General Fund. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) cannot support this measure as the Department is in concert with the provisions of Article VII, Section 11 of the State Constitution and Section 37-41, Hawaii Revised Statutes, which stipulate that any unencumbered appropriation at the close of the fiscal period shall lapse into the General Fund. The Department provides the following comments with regard to other funding sources (eg. grants, contributions) received by the SWCDs.

The SWCD Program is administratively attached to the Department. There are a total of 16 Districts, representing every community on all major islands. The purpose of the SWCD Program is to educate, construct, maintain, and assist in the development of conservation plans to protect soil and water resources. Each SWCD is operated by a 5-member volunteer board. Each of the 16 SWCDs receives \$2,050 per year in state general funds toward their operating expenses through the Department.

Other funds required for each Districts' operation and implementation of projects must be sought in the form of grants from other agencies, such as the various counties, Federal Natural Resources Conservation Service or the State Department of Health. These grants are supervised by the granting agency and are provided for specific purposes. Requiring moneys from these grants to be placed in the State General Fund, subject to another level of control, may hinder the Districts' ability to perform their work in a timely manner.

Good Morning Chairs Ito and Tsuji. My Name is John Astilla; I am the Conservation Specialist for the 4 Maui Soil & Water Conservation Districts (SWCD).

I would like to testify that I strongly support HB 241. If HB 241 is passed, the 16 Soil & Water Conservation Districts that comprise the Hawaii Association of Conservation Districts (HACD) will be allowed to keep its unspent revenues to carry out its district functions.

Currently, Chapter 180-16 allows the State to take the Soil & Water Conservation District's contributions, money and funds and place it into the State General Fund. The loss of those funds would, in essence, make it impossible for the SWCDs to operate. Without these additional supporting revenues and in-kind services from other agencies and businesses, many of our districts would not be able to operate or exist. Without these funds and our ability to hold them in reserve, district employees, contractors and vendors who supply our operating materials and services would not get paid timely or not get paid at all.

The SWCDs are a subdivision of the State governement, empowered through Chapter 180 to act on behalf of the State of Hawaii to develop plans, construct, coordinate and maintain projects, form associations, conduct research and training. Each district has unique community and environmental needs. Most of our directors are knowledgeable land stewards and community members, who volunteer to work closely on their community's conservation issues. There are many examples of Maui SWCD sponsored projects on Maui that have benefited both the environment and community stakeholders. For example, many of the sediments basins implemented in West Maui were a direct result of SWCD involvement. West Maui's near shore waters are no longer clouded by sediment all year round.

Chapter 180 authorizes DLNR to provide operating funds to districts. Currently each district receives \$2,360 annually as operating funds. In order to operate effectively, districts have sought and received grant funds and in-kind support from County and Federal Government, and private donations. Chapter 180-13 allows districts to generate its own revenues through various means.
