# STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON H.B. 2430 RELATING TO PROCUREMENT

The ILWU Local 142 supports H.B. 2430, which permits bidders and their subcontractors who are registered under an apprenticeship agreement with DLIR to benefit from a 5% reduction in their bid amount on contracts for \$250,000 or more.

When public monies are used, taxpayers will want the best value for their dollar. Apprenticeship programs help to ensure that those working on public works projects are qualified and trained in their respective trade. A state-approved apprenticeship program will provide workers with the knowledge of the trade and help them develop the skills required for the trade on the job.

This measure seeks to provide a benefit to those subcontractors who are registered under a DLIR apprenticeship agreement. We believe this is appropriate since general contractors receive this consideration and will serve as an incentive for more subcontractors to participate in an apprenticeship program.

Dear Chair McKelvey:

The ILWU Local 142 submitted testimony to your Committee yesterday in support of H.B. 2430, Relating to Procurement. We wish to amend our testimony before you proceed with decision-making tomorrow.

Upon subsequent review of the bill, we believe H.B. 2430 will undermine the law that was enacted last year allowing an incentive for bidders with registered apprenticeship agreements. With H.B. 2430, if the subcontractor has an apprenticeship agreement, the bidder need not. This would seem to be contrary to the intent of the law recently passed.

We, therefore, withdraw our support for H.B. 2430. Thank you for considering our change in position.
