The Office of Housing and Community Development opposes HB2435 which grant temporary relief from county housing requirements.

Reducing the county's affordable housing requirement by forty percent would be contradictory to its efforts to gain long-term affordable housing inventory.

Relaxing the requirement would reduce pockets of housing to be developed throughout the island, which ultimately reduces housing options for county working. As a result, families will be negatively impacted by increased commuting times, thereby reducing their (1) quality of life and (2) time that they could otherwise focus on strengthening social relationships with family.

If reducing affordable housing inventory and adding an additional burden to already struggling, working families is the intent of this bill, then that is what the ultimate impact would be.

<u>Strongly supports</u> HB 2435 Relating to Housing (Granting temporary relief from county housing requirements)

Honorable Chair Rida Cabanilla and Vice Chair Pono Chong and Members Of Committee on Housing:

My name is Dave Arakawa, and I am the Executive Director of the Land Use Research Foundation of Hawaii (LURF), a private, non-profit research and trade association whose members include major Hawaii landowners, developers and a utility company. One of LURF's missions is to advocate for reasonable, rational and equitable land use planning, legislation and regulations that encourage wellplanned economic growth and development, while safeguarding Hawaii's significant natural and cultural resources and public health and safety.

LURF strongly supports this bill.

Granting temporary relief from county housing requirements as recommended by the construction industry task force to stimulate housing construction statewide.

LURF'S SUPPORT TO HB 2435. LURF respectfully **supports HB 2435**, based on, among other things, the following:

LURF is in **strong support of HB 2435**, which grants temporary relief from county housing requirements by temporarily reducing the county affordable and workforce housing requirements by forty per cent, until December 30, 2015. HB 2435 was recommended by the Legislature's Construction Industry Task Force to stimulate housing construction statewide.

State and county affordable and workforce housing requirements often result in significant delays prior to the start of construction, because some of those

requirements are so onerous and costly that in certain circumstances, the requirements prevent affordable and workforce housing from being built.

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 132, S.D. 1 (2009) established a task force to determine the economic contributions of the construction industry in Hawaii. As directed in SCR 132, (2009), the Task Force has developed a series of proposals for state actions to preserve and create new jobs in the local construction industry. The intent of HB 2435 is to implement one of the Task Force's proposals. Accordingly, the purpose of this bill is to provide temporary relief from county requirements to stimulate housing construction statewide.

We appreciate the opportunity to testify in **strong support of HB 2435**, and we ask for your favorable consideration of this bill.
