TESTIMONY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

HOUSE BILL NO. 2262

COMMITTEES ON ECONOMIC REVITALIZATION, BUSINESS & MILITARY AFFAIRS AND TRANSPORTATION

The Department of Transportation opposes this bill, because it is contrary to 49 CFR 383.3, which allows exemptions only for active duty military personnel. Also, 49 CFR 383.73 mandates states to require CDL applicants to complete the CDL application and testing processes. Passage of this bill would put the State out of compliance with federal regulations, which could cause the State to lose a significant amount of federal funding - approximately \$4,600,000 (or 5 percent) of federal-aid highway funds (based on fiscal year 2007-2008 funding) for the first year of noncompliance and \$9,300,000 (or 10 percent) per year thereafter.

Subject: H.B. No. 2662, Relating to Commercial Driver's License

The City and County of Honolulu and the Examiner of Drivers from all counties are opposed to H.B. No. 2662 which will exempt former military personnel from CDL licensure while operating commercial motor vehicles for military purposes.

Since these individuals are no longer under military control, these individuals and their employers would not be required to meet the requirements of Chapter 286, Part XIII, Commercial Driver Licensing, HRS, which protects the driving public from unsafe and possibly unqualified drivers of these large commercial motor vehicles.

The City and County of Honolulu and the County Examiner of Drivers recommend that H.B. No. 2662 be held.

TESTIMONY BEFORE THE HOUSE COMMITTEES ON ECONOMIC REVITALIZATION BUSINESS AND MILITARY AFFAIRS, AND ON TRANSPORTATION ON HB 2662 RELATING TO COMMERCIAL DRIVER LICENSE

Thank you Chair McKelvey, Chair Souki and committee members. I am Gareth Sakakida, Managing Director of the Hawaii Transportation Association (HTA) with over 400 transportation related members throughout the state of Hawaii.

Hawaii Transportation Association has concerns with this bill.

The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's motor carrier safety regulations does not permit operation of a commercial motor vehicle (CMV) without a commercial driver license (CDL) for former military personnel. Not having uniform regulations subjects the state to loss of funds.

Holders of CDLs are held to a higher standard of safety, and face a structured disqualification system. If someone driving a CMV commits one of the disqualifying offenses I do not know how the judicial system would know that this person is subject to the higher standards.

When this person produces their driver license at a roadside inspection I do not know how an officer would be able to determine whether the driver is permitted to drive a CMV.

A CDL is a symbol of meeting certain qualifications of the federal regulations, I do not know how anyone would be able to determine whether the driver has met any of the regulations without a CDL.

There are a number of special skill areas (double/triple trailer, passenger, tank, hazardous materials, school bus) that are tested in the CDL process, and I do not know if these will be automatically given to the driver.

If the former military member is already skilled in operating a CMV, it is not an undue burden to obtain a CDL.
