Your Committee on Finance, to which was referred H.B. No. 686 entitled:

"A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REDUCED IGNITION PROPENSITY CIGARETTES,"

begs leave to report as follows:

The purpose of this bill is to facilitate the transition to reduced ignition propensity cigarettes (RIPCs) by:

- (1) Delaying the implementation of the RIPC Law from September 30, 2009, to September 30, 2010;
- (2) Establishing a special revolving fund for the State Fire Council (SFC) to hire personnel to administer the RIPC program and to cover program costs.

The SFC, Honolulu Fire Department, County of Maui Department of Fire and Public Safety, Hawaii Fire Department, Kauai Fire Department, and the Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawaii supported this bill. The Department of Budget and Finance offered comments.

Your Committee has amended this bill by:

(1) Changing the effective date to July 1, 2020, to encourage further discussion; and

(2) Making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for consistency and clarity.

As affirmed by the record of votes of the members of your Committee on Finance that is attached to this report, your Committee is in accord with the intent and purpose of H.B. No. 686, as amended herein, and recommends that it pass Third Reading in the form attached hereto as H.B. No. 686, H.D. 1.

RELATING TO REDUCED IGNITION PROPENSITY CIGARETTES

House Bill No. 686, H.D. 1, delays the implementation of the reduced ignition propensity cigarettes law to September 30, 2010, and creates a special revolving fund to receive a \$375 fee every three years from the manufacturer for certification testing and authorizes the State Fire Council to expend the funds to cover the personnel and program costs.

We have concerns with this bill. As a matter of general policy, this department does not support the creation of any special or revolving fund which does not meet the requirements of Sections 37-52.3 and 37-53.4 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. Special or revolving funds should: 1) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries of the program; 2) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 3) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. Although the State Fire Council is authorized to annually adjust the certification fee, it is difficult to determine whether the fund will be self-sustaining.

The Hawaii Fire Department supports HB 686, HD 1, which proposes to extend the RIPC compliance date from September 30, 2009, to September 30, 2010. The bill also seeks to establish a special revolving fund with cigarette certification fees to be administered by the State Fire Council.

Act 218, 2008 Legislative Session, which is now 132C Hawaii Revised Statutes, was passed with the purpose to reduce cigarette caused fires by requiring all cigarettes sold in the state be of a reduced ignition propensity type. The law states that cigarette manufacturers are assessed triennially a \$375 fee per brand type and for the SFC to implement and administer the program. Twenty-two states have similar legislation in effect and 16 states have passed legislation to implement the program. The State Fire Marshal's Office for each of these states has the responsibility for the program and works cooperatively with their Attorney General's Office. Hawaii is the only state without a State Fire Marshal, but instead has the State Fire Council, which is comprised of the four county fire chiefs and administratively attached to the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations.

- Receive, verify, and approve certifications for approximately 1,100 different cigarette brands from manufacturers.
