Testimony in Support of House Bill 692 <u>Relating to Children's Health Care</u> Submitted by Beth Giesting, CEO February 13, 2009, 8:30 a.m. agenda, Room 329

The Hawaii Primary Care Association asks your support for this measure. We greatly appreciate the Legislature's concern for ensuring that none of Hawaii's keiki goes without health care and re-introducing this concept after the original program was abruptly terminated last year.

Hawaii is very fortunate to have expansive Med-QUEST programs that cover our children – including immigrants and COFA migrants – in families with incomes up to 300% of poverty. There is a small group of children, however, who are not eligible for public insurance and whose parents cannot afford to pay premiums. Our experience with 2008's Keiki Care program tells us that this amounts to about 2,000 children.

We believe that Hawaii can and should invest this modest appropriation to ensure that all children have access to the health care they need most. While our Community Health Centers are the best places to direct families for comprehensive primary health care, they are unable to help when children need emergency care, specialists, or hospitalization. It should be noted that Hawaii is expected to soon be able to get federal matching funds for children covered by Med-QUEST programs. Some of that money should be reprogrammed to pay for Keiki Care. We also believe that the costs for coverage are considerably less than the potential financial losses to our hospitals for uncompensated ER and inpatient care for uninsured children, not to mention the potential harm to children who don't get care they need.

Thank you for your consideration of this measure and for the opportunity to testify in its support.
