HOUSE BILL NO. 918 RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL LAND USE

Chairperson Tsuji and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 918 that seeks to amend Chapter 46, HRS to allow farming operations, as defined in Section 165-2, HRS to construct "nonsignificant structures" without county building permits. "Nonsignificant structures" include greenhouses and sheds that are permitted on the land, and are limited in area and construction cost. The Department of Agriculture supports the intent of this measure, however we defer to the counties who are responsible for issuing and monitoring building permits as there may be health and safety issues that need to be considered.

Section 165-2, HRS defines farming operations as a commercial endeavor. By this reference, the building of "nonsignificant structures" would be limited to parcels of agricultural land where there is agricultural activity. We believe this measure needs to include a definition of "commercial" agriculture to provide the counties with quantifiable attributes describing acceptable agricultural activity expected to merit building "nonsignificant structures."

Dear Chair Tsuji and Members:

Subject: House Bill No. 918
Related to Agricultural Land Use

The Department of Planning and Permitting **opposes** this bill, which requires certain farming structures to be constructed without a county building permit.

While we support the economic health and preservation of our agricultural industry, we oppose this bill on the basis of homerule.

Counties are clearly responsible for regulating construction and issuing building permits. This bill would jeopardize public safety by arbitrarily defining what is a "non-significant structure", and therefore exempt from building permit. We have had some experience in exempting minor structures from the building permit process. It has resulted in zoning code violations, encroachments into adjacent properties, and a cumulative change in neighborhood character.

If minor agricultural structures can be exempted from building permit review without sacrificing public safety and other public concerns, this determination should be made by administrators of building codes. Coincidentally, we are currently reviewing our building code, and may be recommending changes on exempt structures.

In the meantime, please file this bill.
