TESTIMONY ON HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 162
URGING THE PROVISIONS OF EDUCATION TO INCARCERATED PARENTS TO
ENSURE CHILD SUPPORT ISSUES ARE ADDRESSED WITHOUT DELAY AND
UPON RELEASE, TO PREPARE THEM FOR REINTEGRATION WITH THEIR
CHILDREN AND FAMILIES, INCLUDING GRANDPARENTS WHO HAVE RAISED
THEIR CHILDREN

Representative Hanohano, Representative Aquino, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Public Safety (PSD is unable to support this measure at this time. As written, this measure request's PSD make mandatory participation in parenting classes for all offenders that are parents, and requests PSD enhance the parenting class by including training regarding how soon-to-be-released parents can:

- Renew contacts with their children and grandparents and other family members caring for their children;
- 2. Prevent or avoid conflict and disrupting the lives of their children and grandparents who have been raising their children; and
- 3. Prepare themselves for assuming full responsibility as a parent.

Unfortunately, due to budget constraints, PSD no longer offers parenting classes for offenders incarcerated in our State facilities. Therefore, we are unable to comply with the provisions of this measure as they relate to our facilities. However, we do continue to offer parenting classes for those incarcerated on the mainland at the Saguaro Correctional Center in Arizona.

This measure also requests that PSD inform parents being incarcerated that it is the their responsibility to contact the respective court in reference to child support obligations and to inform the court of their inability to pay child support due to incarceration, which PSD can do. PSD respectfully requests clarity regarding the length of the incarceration period that would trigger notification to the parent being incarcerated.

Further, at present PSD provides a monthly report to the Department of Human Services of all persons in our custody and care, which is used to assist in determining eligibility for various State and Federal benefits. This same report can be provided to the Judiciary for dissemination to the appropriate court having jurisdiction over the incarcerated parent's child support case. We believe this to be an efficient way to notify the courts of all person's incarcerated during any given month. Another avenue for the court's to be notified would be to simply require the Judiciary to internally notify the respective court having jurisdiction over child support cases of an order to incarcerate a parent that is originates from another court within the Judiciary.

Finally, as currently written, PSD cannot support provisions of HCR 162 and must oppose it as it is impractical, has unbudgeted fiscal impact, and negatively affects the priorities set forth in the Executive Supplemental Budget for Fiscal Year 2010-2011.

Education and supports that help to maintain the parent-child relationship during incarceration and address re-entry to community issues benefit all family members and reduce the stress and trauma experienced by the children.



Aloha Chair Hanohano, Vice Chair Aquino and Members of the Committee!

My name is Kat Brady and I am the Coordinator of Community Alliance on Prisons, a diverse community initiative working to improve conditions of confinement for Hawai's incarcerated individuals, enhance the quality of justice, and promote public safety by supporting smart justice policies. We come today to speak for the 6,000+ individuals whose voices have been silenced by incarceration, always mindful that almost 2,000 of those individuals are serving their sentences abroad, thousands of miles from their homes and loved ones.

HCR 162 urges the provision of education to ensure child support issues are addressed without delay and upon release to prepare them for reintegration with their children and families, including grandparents who have raised their children.

Community Alliance on Prisons supports the good intention of this measure. And we want to thank all the grandparents who are raising their grandchildren. You are the heroes.

We assert that the Department of Public Safety can help incarcerated parents reenter the family by:

- Supporting and encouraging family visitation
  This has been an ongoing problem because visits at Hawai'i facilities are often cancelled because of staff shortages.
- Promoting family activities throughout the incarceration of the individual (Kids Day, Teen Night, etc.)

There are programs at some facilities for parents with young children (not enough), but very little for teens with an incarcerated parent. In CAP's experience, parents returning home often have the most difficult time reconnecting with their teenage children. Encouraging connection <u>before</u> release can help smooth this transition.

> Bringing children and parents together in facilitated groups or sessions to promote reintegration

The Community Safety Act of 2007 – Hawai'i's Reentry Law – states that reentry begins the day an individual is incarcerated. Family reunification (in situations where it is appropriate) is part of reentry and must be incorporated in all programming.

> Advising parents of the laws and their responsibilities

This information must be part of the overall programming during the individual's incarceration. Giving a person a list of obligations to be fulfilled as they are walking out the door is NOT helpful. This information must be integrated into the individual's programming throughout incarceration.

> Assisting parents to meet the obligations of parenthood

Most individuals exit incarceration with long lists of debts, obligations, conditions, etc. It is important that the correctional system change its philosophy from punishment to *correcting* behavior. This would start with accountability on the side of PSD to model the behavior that is expected of individuals when they return to their communities.

In summary, we support the good intent of this measure and hope that the committee sees that PSD must help individuals maintain connections with their loved ones throughout their incarceration so that the return to their families and our communities will be less traumatic for all.
