On behalf of the University of Hawai'i at Hilo (UHH) College of Pharmacy, thank you for the opportunity to support HCR 17. The Beacon Community Cooperative Agreement Program is funded through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology (ONC) under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009. This program will provide funding to communities to build and strengthen their health information technology (IT) infrastructure and exchange capabilities to demonstrate the vision of the future where hospitals, clinicians, and patients are meaningful users of health IT and together the community achieves measureable improvements in health care quality, safety, efficiency, and population health.

The UHH College of Pharmacy is the lead applicant organization for the Hawai'i County Beacon Community Consortium (HCBCC) application that was submitted on January 29.
